Pastor's Letter

On September 19th, I began a three-week series on peacemaking. This series will end on World Communion Sunday. The focus of this series has been on war/violence, nuclear arms, and economics. However, there is another aspect to peacemaking that I have been reminded of and that is peacemaking through caring for others. The wonderful hymn, *O For A World*, speaks to this kind of peacemaking.

O for a world where everyone
Respects each other's ways,
Where love is lived and all is done
With justice and with praise.

O for a world where goods are shared
And misery relieved,
Where truth is spoken, children spared,
Equality achieved.

We welcome one world family
And struggle with each choice
That opens us to unity
And gives our vision voice.

The poor are rich, the weak are strong,
The foolish ones are wise.
Tell all who mourn: outcasts belong,
Who perishes will rise.

October is a month that gives us opportunities to reflect on this kind of peacemaking. While peacemaking through working against war, fighting for the abolishing of all nuclear weapons, and working for an economic structure that is just is important business for all of us to be about, it is also easy to feel that it is too big for us to do anything about. In many ways, the month of October reminds us that peacemaking in the big things begins in the smaller things. In October, we find not only *World Communion* (Oct. 3), but also *Domestic Violence Awareness* (Oct. 10), *World Food Day* (Oct. 16), *Children's Sabbath* (Oct. 17), and *United Nations Day* (Oct. 24). We can easily do things for most of these. We can support shelters for women and children to get out of abusive relationships. We can walk to raise funds for hunger in the annual CROP Walk. We can give food and work at food pantries and food banks. We can stand up for the safety and rights of children.

In our daily lives we have a number of opportunities to be peacemakers. I'm reminded of a quote by the late Ralph Bunche who was the first black person to ever win the Nobel Peace Prize. He won it for his work for peace in Palestine. He was also instrumental in the formation and administration of the United Nations.

Peace, to have meaning for many who have only known suffering in both peace and war, must be translated into bread or rice, shelter, health, and education, as well as freedom and human dignity.

What can you do to make peace in your daily life?

The peanut butter will be given to the Starfish Food Pantry in Plainfield, NJ.

World Communion Sunday, originally called World Wide Communion Sunday, which occurs on the first Sunday in October, originated in the Presbyterian Church (USA). It was celebrated for the first time in 1936 in Presbyterian churches in the United States and overseas. From the beginning, it was planned so that other denominations could make use of it and, after a few years, the idea spread beyond the Presbyterian Church. This year on World Communion Sunday, the youth of the church will be participating in the worship service. In addition, the Worship Committee invites everyone to dress up in the garb of your particular nationality or country. The clothing item could be as simple as a vest.

Also, if you have made paper cranes using the instructions Rev. Peters handed out in church, please bring them so that they can be placed on the Communion table. Don't forget to write your prayer for peace on the wings.

Looking Ahead:**All Saints Sunday**

On **November 7th**, we will be celebrating *All Saints Sunday*, a day when Christians give thanks for all the good people God has placed in our lives. At this service, we will take time to remember those special people who have passed away during the past year. If you are unable to be in church over the next few weeks, please contact the church office with the names of anyone you would like remembered ***and*** their relationship to you. Heritage Sunday

Equal Exchange Coffee

We have been looking into purchasing a different brand of coffee at the church in order to support a program called "Equal Exchange." We have decided to purchase the first case of Equal Exchange coffee to see if this is something we want to continue buying to help these farmers. Each case contains five pounds of coffee. Here is a description of the mission behind the coffee.

"Through Equal Exchange's Interfaith Program, your congregation, school, or office can enjoy delicious, fairly traded products while supporting small-scale farmers across the world. Farmers earn a fair price for their products, have access to affordable credit, and can invest in education, health care, and sustainable agriculture, enabling them to build a better future for their families."

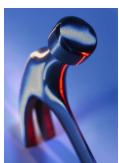
Coffee Hour

Mile of Pennies
