Pastor's Letter

This past July, a group of us from the three churches met and discussed the topic, <u>Was Our Nation Founded as a Christian Nation</u>? It was an interesting discussion, and we decided that, while we often cite the Bill of Rights and say that religious freedom was a hallmark of our nation at it's founding, we also realized that religious freedom was only the truth if you believed what the leaders believed! In the beginning days of our nation and the individual colonies/states, it becomes quite clear that certain Protestant Christian denominations were the only accepted religion. Roman Catholicism in almost all of the states, and the Church of England, or Anglicanism, in most of the states, was not accepted. Even Quakers were not accepted in many states. Of course forget about the Jews and the Muslims having religious freedom. By not being accepted I mean that, in most cases, they had to leave the town or, in some cases, even the state!

I bring this up because of the debate going on around the creation of an Islamic community center and mosque <u>near</u>, not at, Ground Zero in NYC. It has been interesting to hear what many different people and groups have had to say about this. People and groups who you might expect to say no are saying yes, and many who you would think would not even care are saying no. Jewish groups, many families of those who died on 9/11, the Mayor, and the President of the United States have all said yes, they should be allowed to build it. However, many Christians who often talk about religious freedom in our country are saying no. I hear echoes of our founding fathers in this: Religious freedom, as long as your faith agrees with mine.

In a little over a week, we will be observing the ninth anniversary of 9/11. I recall that there were many people of the Islamic faith who died when those towers fell. Why are we so fearful of having real religious freedom in our country? It in no way minimizes our faith to let others practice their faith. In fact, to be so "my belief or no belief" is evidence of a weak faith. How does it hurt or impinge on you if others around you may be worshipping God in a different way or even worshipping a different God, if they do not get in the way of you practicing your faith? As Bob Braun noted in the Star Ledger, the community center and mosque will be two blocks away, you won't even be able to see them from Ground Zero, and most people won't even know where it is or that it is there. Why not let go of the fear and anger and truly be a people, a nation that gives the idea of religious freedom more than lip service.

The General Assembly (GA) of the PCUSA met this summer for its biannual meeting. At our next "Fifth Tuesday" joint church discussion, we will learn about "What Happened at GA?" and what it might mean for us. It will be held on Tuesday, August 31st, 7:30 p.m., at FPC Stirling and will be led by our own Rev. Tom Peters.

"The Confession of Belhar: What We Need to Know to Vote Prayerfully"

One action taken by this summer's GA was to send **The Belhar Confession** to the presbyteries to be voted upon. (Our presbytery is voting on it in January.) It needs a 2/3 vote to move on to approval at the 2012 General Assembly before becoming the 12th document in the <u>Book of Confessions</u>.

It is a wonderful cry from the heart of the mixed race Reformed Church in 1986 during apartheid in South Africa. One of its central themes is "Unity." At this presentation and discussion, we will explore the very Presbyterian reasons for why this belongs in our <u>Book of Confessions</u>.

The Rev. Janet McCune Edwards, Ph.D., of Pittsburgh, PA, Co-Moderator of "More Light" Presbyterians, will be at Trinity United Church on Saturday, September 18th at 10:00 a.m. for this presentation and discussion on the Belhar Confession.
