Pastor's Letter

Recently I came across these words by Rabbi Harold Kushner in an essay entitled <u>God's</u> Fingerprints on the Soul:

We must remember that everything in this world has God's fingerprints on it – and that alone makes it special. Our inability to see beauty doesn't suggest in the slightest that beauty is not there. Rather, it suggests that we are not looking carefully enough or with broad enough perspective to see the beauty.

Can you see the holiness in those things that you take for granted – a paved road or a washing machine? If you concentrate on finding what is good in every situation, you will be filled with gratitude, a feeling that nurtures the soul.

We live in a time when it seems that the opposite rule is in effect – look for the ugliness in everything. Look for the ugliness in people of other religions, in the person who disagrees with you. This thought, combined with the quote, reminded me that as we continue through our season of Lent and then enter Holy Week what we really need to be about is re-setting the lens that we look at everything through. We need to start by recognizing that those who believe differently and those who disagree with us have God's fingerprint on them as well.

We need to remind ourselves that Christ did not go to the cross for us because we deserved it but because he loved us in spite of our sin. Lent is our time to remember that. Holy Week is our time to remember that there are many times in our lives when we would have said "crucify him" had we been in the crowd that day. We have said it when we denounced someone for who they are or what they believe. We have said it when we have averted our eyes from someone truly in need because we did not want to get involved.

Rabbi Kushner reminds us that if we can find the holiness in everything, then we will be filled with gratitude – and isn't that what Easter is all about!? If we can see the fingerprints of God on each and every person and thing – then Easter would be the gratitude of realizing that God's fingerprints are on us as well, that God's great love for all life, including ours, keeps the promise of life available to all of us.

As we continue through Lent, I hope it can be for you and for me a time to reset the lens of our hearts. I will admit that we may have a hard time finding the holiness in the potholes around town, but then maybe they are there to remind us that we need to slow down and see where we are going--and that could be a beautiful thing.
