# Pastor's Letter

I would venture to say that humanity is fast reaching that point of losing all perspective. In today's digital, technological world we are so intent on discovering every little truth about things people say and do and of why things happen the way they do. Humanity has reached the microscopic level of understanding how the world and people act, but we are forgetting to take our eyes away from the microscope and see the larger picture. We hear and react to every little political gaffe, every reason why a sports figure is off their game in one game, etc. We want to know the smallest details. And while there are times when it is important to know those details, more often than not it detracts for our human experience. Every person stumbles eventually under such close scrutiny. We see this most in our political election process. When we delve into the details, it is difficult to see the larger picture. I recall a comic phrase, attributed to President Reagan, that speaks to this.

When you're up to your armpits in alligators, it is hard to remember that your original intent was to drain the swamp.

This idea of losing perspective leads me to the season of Advent. Advent is a season, like Lent, that challenges us to reset, or regain, our perspective. Advent recognizes that our lives and the world are not what we want or know they should be. Advent also reminds us that God is in the world - God has come and is coming, and we can take our eyes off the problems and see the larger picture -- the world is still in the hands of God. The themes we will be using for the four Sundays of Advent are: longing, peace, hope, and joy. Those are expressions that can only come when we see the big picture of God in our midst. So I would encourage you to find times this Advent season when you can get away from the microscope of what has to be done, of tired aching spirits, and reflect on the big picture of God in the world. Recover your spiritual perspective for the season and beyond. I would also encourage you to join us on Friday nights to watch movies designed to lift up the four Advent themes and then join us in discussion of the movies.


# **Interfaith Hospitality Network - 2012**
