Pastor's Letter

By now, perhaps many of you have heard that the Presbyterian Church (USA) has passed the overture (10-A) from last year's 219th General Assembly giving churches and presbyteries the right to ordain gays and lesbians to the offices of Elder, Deacon, and Minister. I want everyone to be clear on what exactly has taken place, because there is going to be a lot of misinformation going around and, yes, there will still be a lot of pain for several reasons.

First of all, this vote will not take effect until July 17th. Votes do not take effect until all of the presbyteries have voted, and there are still some 25 presbyteries that have yet to vote. We are able to say that 10-A has passed because they passed the number needed for a majority (87 of 173 presbyteries).

Overture 10-A does **<u>not</u>** mandate that every church and every presbytery must allow for the ordination for gays and lesbians. I've included below what the actual amendment to the constitution says.

Standards for ordained service reflect the church's desire to submit joyfully to the Lordship of Jesus Christ in all aspects of life (G-1.0000). The governing body responsible for ordination and/or installation (G.14.0240; G-14.0450) shall examine each candidate's calling, gifts, preparation, and suitability for the responsibilities of office. The examination shall include, but not be limited to, a determination of the candidate's ability and commitment to fulfill all requirements as expressed in the constitutional questions for ordination and installation (W-4.4003). Governing bodies shall be guided by Scripture and the confessions in applying standards to individual candidates.

In essence, what this amendment does is allow individual churches and presbyteries to determine the calling and suitability of a candidate to an ordained office based upon their understanding of the Bible and the PCUSA Constitution, as contained in both parts (Book of Order and Book of Confessions). Those churches and presbyteries that continue to see homosexuality as a sin will not find gays and lesbians as suitable for ordination and, therefore, will not allow for ordination. Churches and presbyteries that do not see homosexuality as a sin will be free to set aside one's sexual preference as a defining factor and focus on other aspects of a person's suitability for the office to which they are being called.

This is still a painful issue for the church, and it is possible that some churches may choose to leave the denomination over this. They believe the success of this vote is evidence that the church has lost its Biblical center, while there are many who are saying that the church has found its Biblical center. The pain for me is that once again we're going to go through a difficult time to see if the church can live and thrive with its diversity in theology and practice. I hope we can. When people join the church, we only ask that they accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. That being said, can we live as a denomination with all of the different ideas of what that means to the people in the Church? I hope so. I hope you will join me in keeping our denomination in your prayers.

Tom Parziale, as head of Buildings & Grounds, is an ad hoc member of the committee and invited to all scheduled meetings.

The committee responsibilities include:

- The Manse: handling of lease agreements, renting, repairs, and all correspondence with tenants. Any and all necessary repair work will be closely coordinated with the Buildings & Grounds Committee.
- ✤ All lease agreements with the Montessori School.
- All church building usage fees and agreements with all external organizations. This includes bringing recommendations for usage fees and agreements with groups to the Session.
- Monitor and make recommendations to the Session regarding the church's insurance policies.

This committee <u>will not</u> be responsible for contracts related to grounds maintenance, snow plowing, or the Memorial Garden. Those contracts will fall under the purview of the Buildings and Grounds Committee and the Memorial Garden Committee, respectively.

The committee is planning to meet quarterly or more frequently if needed.
