Pastor's Letter

Have you ever wished you had the opportunity to gather every so often over a cup of coffee and talk with some friends about important things in a setting where you knew you would not be judged? In the 17th century, the French had what they called the *Salons* where people gathered to talk about literary works and philosophy. In a time when people are becoming increasingly afraid to talk about important things because they fear the judgment of others, we need to reclaim this old method of connecting with one another. I invite you to consider being a part of a group like this. It would be small enough to be held in people's homes. The host would only have to contribute their place and perhaps something to drink.

Over the next several weeks, I will have five books on a table in Pollard Hall during coffee hour. Please look them over, and put your name down if you find one or more of them to be something you might be interested in reading/discussing. The books are in three areas: *Meaning in Life, Faith, and Spirituality*. You can also review them at <u>www.amazon.com</u>. The titles are:

God at 2000, by Marcus Borg, edited by Ross Mackenzie Spiritual Direction, by Henri Nouwen, edited by Michael Christensen and Rebecca Laird An Altar in the World, by Barbara Brown Taylor Wrestling with Grace, by Robert Corin Morris The Life of Meaning, by Bob Abernethy and William Bole

The group would gather once a month in the home of one of those in the class. I would hold the first one in my home. Participants would read a chapter or several chapters before the gathering, and then we would respond to questions and share insights that have been gathered by members of the group. I would like to see a group of 8-10 people and, if there are more, we could have several groups. But, I would ask that we all be on the same book. We could also have a day group and a night group.

There will be a sheet on the table with the books with some possible gathering times, and I ask that you put your name by all of the ones that would work for you so that we can find a time(s) that helps the most people. I hope you will consider this opportunity to "go deeper" into some important questions with people who love and support you.

The church is celebrating the 175th anniversary of their chartering and the 125th anniversary of their current building (pictured here).

Celebration Sermon Series

While that is a somber day for our nation on the tenth anniversary of 9/11, it is also our Rally Day, which marks the beginning of our education program year. Remembering 9/11



On Sunday, **Sept. 11th**, there will be a 10th Anniversary Ecumenical Service at the Tower of Remembrance at the Shrine of St. Joseph in Stirling at 7:30 p.m. Our Travnicek Memorial Ringers will be participating in the service. Bring a lawn chair. In case of inclement weather, the service will be held in the Shrine Chapel.

The History of the Tower of Remembrance

... a place of healing, prayer, and peace honoring the innocent victims who died on September 11, 2001:

This memorial combines steel from the North Tower Building of the World Trade Center and bells from the Missionary Servants of the Most Holy Trinity's Seminary in Monroe, Virginia. The structure is an extension of God's magnificent natural beauty, a place of great reverence and sacredness.

The bells were originally blessed and installed in 1960 at the Seminary and rang there until 1973. They have been silent since then. Bells have always been significant in calling people. These bells will ring out calling all people to pray and work faithfully for world peace, so that these victims will not have died in vain. This Tower of Remembrance emerging from the rubble of violence will remind us that in God there is hope; that as we remember, we heal. The name of each innocent victim who died at the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and in the field in Pennsylvania is inscribed on the memorial walls.

The Tower of Remembrance is a place where everyone can reflect on the sacredness of lives remembered. A bell tolls forty-six minutes after each hour starting at 8:46 A.M. and ending at 8:46 P.M. It tolls four times in remembrance of the lives lost at the North Tower, at the South Tower, at the Pentagon, and in the field in Pennsylvania.

Another Successful Summer Joint Adult Ed Series

Once again, we held Summer Adult Education classes jointly with Trinity United Church (Warren) and Meyersville Presbyterian Church. The *Echoes-Sentinel* ran a piece at the beginning of the summer about the program, and we opened it to the community. Our six-week joint-church program (held Wednesday evenings, July 6-August 10, at 7:30 in our **air-conditioned** child care room) had **22 total participants**, **representing 6 different churches.** Sessions included three "Contemporary" topics (theology/current events) and three "Biblical" topics. Sessions were led by pastors Tom Peters (who led two sessions) and Barbara Aspinall and three different lay leaders from Trinity United Church.

Attendance ranged from 11 to 17 people, **averaging 14** participants per session; six people came to <u>every</u> session. (Our church's attendance ranged from 5 to 9 and averaged 6 people per session.)

This was our third year sponsoring this series. It has been well-received and well-attended, especially for a summer program. Attendees expressed the wish to return next summer. We look forward to it!

Fourth Sunday Focus

Since Hurricane Irene had other ideas last Sunday morning, our Fourth Sunday Focus has been **rescheduled for Sept. 4**th. Our topic is: "<u>If I Had A Million Dollars.</u>"

Fourth Sundays give us an opportunity to connect with other members of our church family in a relaxed atmosphere: a pot of tea, a Box o'Joe,
