Pastor's Letter

I must say that religion has certainly been in the news lately, but not, I'm afraid, in a positive way. There has been quite a bit of declaring who has the right faith and who doesn't. Religion and faith have been used a lot lately to build walls between people, and not just between Christians. One can only wonder what some of our men and women in uniform were thinking when they burned copies of the Qur'an in Afghanistan. It doesn't do well to burn the holy books of a faith that is predominant in the country where the books were burned.

Is it any wonder that men and women of all ages are giving up their faith or not even considering being part of a faith tradition because they are seeing how religious people are beating each other up? We begin to fully understand the wisdom of our founders when they wrote the 1st Amendment to the U.S. Constitution:

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof;



We can only imagine how much worse things would be if that was not in the Bill of Rights. This is not why Jesus went to the cross - so that we can beat each other up. The Pharisees embodied much of the talk and rhetoric that we are seeing today, and that is what put Jesus on the cross. But it shouldn't be that way and doesn't have to be that way. In our church and in other churches in our Presbytery, we have the opportunity to give a vision of what faith in Jesus is really about. We have the opportunity to give people a Christ-centered vision of the church that is open to, and responds to, the needs of people and the community.

As I mentioned in my sermon on February 19th, the Session has voted to participate in a program called *New Beginnings*. This program helps churches find a new mission and purpose in light of the strengths of the local church and the needs of the community around it. This is a wonderful opportunity for us to discern what new thing God is calling us to do, and, at the same time, give others a vision of the Church that ministers to them and doesn't judge them. For this to happen, it will be vitally important for us to have the input and thoughts of as many people as we can. So when the time comes in the coming months, please be a part of the process when you are asked. It will mean the difference between success and failure. Let's show our community that there is still a compassionate power in our faith and trust in God the Creator, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Per Capita Apportionment

This year, the Session voted to not include per capita in the budget and only send in what people pay towards their per capita. There have been questions about what per capita covers. Per capita is the money that pays for the staff and office expenses at the upper levels of our denomination. It is the only way that presbyteries, Synods, and the General Assembly can get the funds they need to operate. Per Capita is an important part of the connectional system that the Presbyterian Church is. Our Presbytery has supported us with loans and with staff and support help over the years.

Our Per Capita Apportionment for 2012 is \$29 per member. It has been the same for the past three years as the Presbytery has tried to hold down the cost of doing its business. If you have not paid your per capita, please do so, and perhaps consider sending a little more to help cover the cost of someone who does not pay. As Rev. Peters said at our annual meeting, it is important to note that Presbytery has to send the money owed to the Synod and General Assembly; so, if we do not send in all of our money, we force Presbytery to deplete its income by covering our amount due to the Synod and General Assembly. Please help us by doing your part.

Our families have over a 90% success rate in achieving and maintaining self-sufficiency.
