Pastor's Letter

Congregational ministry, like most organizational missions in our day, is undergoing radical change. For the past 30 years, social scientists and cultural historians have been telling us that we are really in a new period in history. Like periods named before (e.g. Mesopotamian era, Greco-Roman period, Renaissance, Enlightenment), our time in history seems to be distinctively different from what has preceded it. We are in a "post-modern" world, characterized by global interconnection, technological revolution, a plurality of philosophical and religious frameworks to describe life and meaning, and unprecedented consumption of the earth's resources by humankind.

In most places in the world, and certainly in North America, people have experienced dramatic changes in the way they receive and process information, the races and languages spoken in city and village streets, the subjects studied in school and the tools used to study, forms of entertainment, and forums for making decisions. Is it any wonder that our congregational ministry should be undergoing dramatic change as well? When we think about it, we are all clear: what worked in the 1950s and 60s doesn't work now. And yet, like the people of the early years of any new historic era, we're not sure at all what will work in these new times, what new forms of church are emerging, and how we will share the gospel in ways appropriate to new generations. For a generation of people who prided themselves on building systems and industries and corporations that "worked," not knowing how to do and be a church is enormously frustrating—not to mention the grief and despair felt over losing "the church" that was so important in days past. The book mentions that 67% of mainline denominations have been in decline. So, we have lots of company in our current predicament. However, unlike a lot of churches, your Session, your pastor, and those who are leading the house meetings have said the present course is not acceptable. So, we will not stay the course, but we will enter into a dialogue together with members of the church and God about a new direction God wants us to take. We will look at how the church needs to be different in today's post-modern world and not only find a new direction but also find a new passion and energy for the ministry of our family of faith.

The house groups will start the week of September 9th, and we hope you will join us. The sign-up sheets for the five different groups are posted, and you may sign up anytime you are at the church. Bridges Outreach Lunch Program

We have recently received some interesting information regarding this program, which we participate in through our donation of 40 lunches each month. Most of us have little knowledge of how the project works, so we will be excerpting items from their publication from time to time to highlight some of what they do.

"The Bridges Run," or outreach visit, is at the heart of the mission to bring the housed and homeless together in community. The Run is an opportunity for a group of trained volunteers, along with a Bridges employee, to go directly to the streets and shelters to meet with homeless men, women, and families.

In this fiscal year (as of May 2012), Bridges made a total of 210 Runs to NYC, Newark, and Irvington, averaging four per week, an 11% increase over last year. Bridges met more than 500 people in need each week and delivered 100,000 brown bag meals; 9,000 toiletry kits; 13,000 pairs of socks; and 1,500 gallons of soup, hot chocolate, and lemonade.



Our next commitment date for preparing <u>40</u> lunches is: **Friday, Sept. 7**th, 9:30 a.m., in Pollard Hall. We are really low on practically everything, so we welcome donations of juice boxes, small water bottles, fruit/pudding cups, snacks of all kinds, fruit, and plastic spoons. You can drop these items off in Pollard Hall on Sunday mornings. We appreciate all the support you have given to this much-needed program.

Pop-Top Can Tabs



Something else you can save are <u>pop-top can tabs</u>. Ronald McDonald Houses collect pop tabs instead of entire aluminum cans because it's more hygienic to store tabs than cans, and collection and storage is easier. Recycling centers send the local Chapter a check for the total value based upon weight. This program is an easy way for people of all ages to support RMH and know they are making a difference for families and children. While it does vary by Chapter, RMHC Upper Midwest raises approximately \$30,000 a year through their pop tab program.

If you would like to support this project, please put the tabs in the same collection canister, and I will sort them out.

The Tower of Remembrance, located at the Shrine of St. Joseph, Long Hill Road, Stirling, is a place where everyone can reflect on the sacredness of lives remembered. A bell tolls forty-six minutes after each hour starting at 8:46 a.m. and ending at 8:46 p.m. It tolls four times in remembrance of the lives lost at the North Tower, at the South Tower, at the Pentagon, and in the field in Pennsylvania.
