# Pastor's Letter

As I write this on the Monday of Holy Week, it is snowing outside. Now I've been around long enough to know that sometimes we have late March and early April snow. However, two Fridays ago I was out playing golf! In the last two years, we have had two *storms of the century* in our area, not to mention the early October snow storm in 2011 that took down many trees in our area and wreaked havoc on our power grid. Scientists are saying that all this "unruly" weather is due to global climate change -- that ice caps and glaciers are melting at an accelerated pace. Our own country is experiencing lasting droughts, the likes of which have not been seen since the *dust bowl* of the 1930's.



Some would say that this climate change is not man made -- that it is just part of the cycle of things. My response is that many of the scientists are saying it is man made and, even if we doubt them, is it not prudent for us to do all we can to live greener lives just in case they are right? Otherwise, we may find ourselves down the road and it becomes clear it is man made, but it is too late to do anything about it. Last summer at Chautauqua I heard lectures on the theme of *Water on Our Planet*. The lecturers made it clear that our planet's water supply is suffering. They said we still have time to reverse it, but we have to act soon.

I bring this up because on <u>Sunday, April 21<sup>st</sup></u>, we will celebrate <u>Earth Day</u>. Earth Day in the Church reminds us that, as servants of God, we are to be stewards of the earth, the environment that God has blessed us with. Not just for ourselves, but for others as well – even those who come after us. D. Elton Trueblood, the late Quaker scholar and writer who lived in the town where I grew up wrote:

"A man has made at least a start on discovering the meaning of human life when he plants shade trees under which he knows full well he will never sit."

This is an expression of great love and faith for the future, and I would suggest that the opposite is true as well: There is no evil greater than the evil done when one generation deprives future generations of shade trees and a healthy, sustainable environment.



Our town has lost a lot of trees over the past two years. Perhaps you will consider planting a new tree in your yard or someplace else. The township has a Challenge Grant to help residents replace trees. There are many ways we can "go green," and it is our faithful response for all that God has given us. Won't you consider doing more to live a "Green" sustainable life? # EARTH DAY 2013 - April 22nd

"Earth Day aims to inspire awareness of and appreciation for earth's environment."

#### Best picture ever taken of Earth:

"Nothing inspires awe and a sense of our place in the universe like seeing our planet from outer space, and a 2012 picture taken by a Russian weather satellite is being hailed as **THE ultimate picture of Earth**. The satellite was orbiting the planet 22,000 miles above the equator and sending back images every 30 minutes. As NASA scientist Robert Simmon points out, the images are made up of light from four different wavelengths combined to illuminate topographical details such as vegetation. The end result is a breathtaking look at our humble little home."



Arbor Day 2013 - April 26th

Arbor Day is a holiday in which individuals and groups are encouraged to plant and care for trees. It originated in Nebraska City, Neb., in the United States in 1872. J. Sterling Morton is the founder of Arbor Day. The first Arbor Day (from the Latin arbor, meaning tree) was held on April 10, 1872, and an estimated 1 million trees were planted that day.

Trees are an important component of the natural landscape because of their prevention of erosion and the provision of a weather-sheltered ecosystem in and under their foliage. They also play an important role in producing oxygen and reducing carbon dioxide in the atmosphere, as well as moderating ground temperatures. (With material from Wikipedia)
