Pastor's Letter

Recently, I came across the following:

A father took his 5-year-old son to several baseball games where "The Star-Spangled Banner" was sung before the start of each game. Then the father and son attended church on a Sunday shortly before Independence Day. The congregation sang "The Star-Spangled Banner" and, after everyone sat down, the little boy suddenly yelled out, "PLAY BALL!!!"

I like this because it captures the Spirit of the Day of Pentecost, which we will celebrate on May 19th. The disciples experienced an indwelling of the Holy Spirit and left the upper room where they had been hiding in fear, and they began to truly be disciples of Jesus Christ. They shared the good news of Jesus. Pentecost is about playing ball, getting to work, doing what we have been called to do.



This year our Pentecost celebration is all the more special because we will be welcoming the members of our Confirmation Class into the membership of the church. They will be



promising to not only believe in Jesus as their Lord and Savior, but also to follow him – to be Jesus' disciples. We can let them challenge us to do a better job in sharing the good news. They are part of the Confirmation Class because people shared the good news with them. Let us do it for others as well.

Gifts of Men Sunday

On Sunday, April 21st, we celebrated Gifts of Men Sunday by recognizing Bill Combs for his contributions to our church and the community. Following worship, the Worship Committee hosted a special fellowship hour in Bill's honor.

Bill and his wife, Lynne (married almost 49 years), were born on the same day. They grew up in Chatham and attended kindergarten through high school together. Bill went on to college in Philadelphia, earning his Bachelor's degree in Economics from the Wharton School at the University of PA. His interest in finance and the stock market led him to Merrill Lynch, from where he retired in 2001 after 36 years.

Bill and Lynne have three grown children, Whitney, Elizabeth, and Will, and have been blessed with six grandchildren. They enjoy traveling, especially when it includes a visit with family. In 1977, Lynne and Bill joined our church. Bill subsequently became chairman of the "Major Mission" campaign (a national Presbyterian fund raiser), served 2 terms on Session, and helped with annual financial audits. Currently, he is Financial Secretary and chairman of the Endowment Fund.

You could say that Bill never sits still! Running has always been part of his life. For ten years, he served as Race Director of the township's 5-Mile Run held every July. He spends five weeks every spring and fall helping with the VNA rummage sale in Far Hills. And, one of his proudest accomplishments is having completed a 3½-month bike trip with Lynne from the Jersey shore to the Oregon shore.

In 2010, Lynne and Bill joined a group of 40 volunteers from the Liberty Corner Presbyterian Church to work in the small city of Entrada, Honduras. Over the past 10 years, this annual mission trip has enabled children to attend a grammar school built by the Church. Honduras is one of the few countries in the world where schooling is not provided by the government. The program also offers dental care to the children and eye examinations to all residents of Entrada, which is where Bill worked during the week's mission. Bill states that the joy of this involvement in a very poor part of the world was very fulfilling.

Bill has managed to accomplish all this while still fulfilling his love of traveling. He has been to 75 countries and all 7 continents and is eager to see more.

Another passion Bill eluded to was his lifelong love of collecting: post cards, stamps, coins, baseball cards, stock certificates, and beer coasters.

Bill admits there just aren't enough hours in a day to accomplish all that he wants to do, but he'll keep trying!

Community Food Bank, Hillside

On Friday, March 29th (Good Friday), 10 of us volunteered at the Community Food Bank in Hillside. Our task, which we had never done before, was located at an annex building up the street. We worked on their "back pack" program,



putting together, assembly-line style, plastic bags filled with food and drinks. The bags are given to school-aged children on Fridays to bring home, in their backpacks, for the weekend. For some children, this is the only nutritional food they will eat all weekend. The 10 of us worked hard for two hours and produced 942 bags of food. Based on the reaction of the food bank worker who supervised and assisted us, we produced an amazing number of bags. In fact, we used up the allocated amount of supplies they had provided for us to use during our time slot. On a weekly basis, the food bank provides over 4,000 of these bags to school children in our region.
