Pastor's Letter

How appropriate that the month of November begins with All Saints Day and almost ends with Thanksgiving. When we think of Thanksgiving, we generally think of a big dinner, followed by a tryptophan-induced state of sleepiness, a parade and, for some, football. Lately, Thanksgiving has also meant the beginning of the holiday shopping season with stores opening on Thanksgiving and trying to induce people to shop by offering big sales. It is no secret that I find this a perversion of Thanksgiving by implying that we should be thankful that we can shop and save money.

Thanksgiving, to me, is about recognizing and giving thanks for relationships --for the people who have been an important part of our lives--some are still with us, and many are enjoying the next life. Thanksgiving is about recognizing that God has blessed us with these people by making our lives intersect. I recognize that Thanksgiving is a difficult time for some families because of strained relationships



within the family. However, if we recognize that we all are part of our human families, whether we like it or not, and part of God's human family, then we might be able to enjoy being together, and that would certainly be worth giving thanks.

I'm reminded of the poster and words of the author Alex Haley who wrote the book, Roots. He had an unusual picture hanging on his office wall. It was a picture of a turtle on top of a fence post. When asked, "Why is that there?," Alex Haley answered, "Every time I write something significant, every time I read my words and think that they are wonderful and begin to feel proud of myself, I look at the turtle on top of the fence post and remember that he didn't get there on his own. He had help."

That is the basis of thankfulness—to remember that we got here with the help of God working by the Spirit through other people. Thanksgiving recognizes that God is the provider of every blessing we have.

Take time this month of thanksgiving to say thanks for those who are no longer with you, but also to say thanks in audible words to those who are still with you. It will mean a lot to them and you.

Update on Bridges

For a number of years, the Mission Committee has been preparing 480 brown bag lunches a year for the Bridges Outreach Program located in Summit. Their efforts are geared toward the homeless in New York City, Irvington, Newark, and Summit. Recently they have opened *Project Connect* at *St. John's Soup Kitchen,* which has long been a beacon for Newark's most vulnerable homeless population.

At *Project Connect,* the homeless have access to a range of medical and social services, with the ultimate goal of finding them housing. In the last six months, more than 600 people have been assisted, and 350 people have received help in obtaining NJ State IDs, without which a person cannot receive benefits or find a bed in a shelter.

In every one of the lunches we prepare, we include the following: meat sandwich, packet of mustard, fruit cup, snack of pudding cup or cookies, fruit drink or small bottle of water, plastic spoon, and napkin. All your donations are very much appreciated.

Emergency Clean-Up Buckets


The Deacons are participating in a Church World Service program by collecting supplies to make Emergency Clean-Up Buckets. These supplies enable people to begin the overwhelming job of cleaning up after a flood, hurricane, tornado, or other disaster here in the US. Our goal is to make at least ten complete buckets. The congregation will assemble the buckets after church on November 23rd. Please give supplies to any of the Deacons, or they can be left on the pew inside Pollard Hall. If you have any questions, ask one of the Deacons. We appreciate any donations of supplies or money to purchase supplies. The buckets are sent out when they are needed. After Hurricane Sandy, buckets were sent to New Jersey to help us recover from the disaster. The list of supplies is as follows:

- √ 5-gallon bucket with resealable lid
- √ 5 scouring pads
- √ 7 sponges (assorted sizes)
- ✓ scrub brush
- √ 18 cleaning towels (like Easy Wipes)
- ✓ 50-78 oz. box of dry laundry detergent
- ✓ 12 oz. bottle of liquid concentrated household cleaner (like *Lysol*)
- ✓ 24-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap (like *Dawn*)
- ✓ pkg. 48-50 clothespins
- ✓ 100 ft. or 2 50 ft. of clothesline
- ✓ 5 dust masks
- ✓ 2 prs. latex gloves
- ✓ pair of work gloves
- ✓ 24-28 heavy duty 30-45 gallon trash bags
- ✓ 6-9 oz. bottle of insect repellent (pump, drops, or lotion not aerosol)



Ongoing Mission Programs

Road to Bridges

Change (and more) collected during coffee hour supports Bridges Program, providing 40 lunches per month for NJ/NY homeless.

Township Food Pantry

Non-perishable items can be left in baskets labeled "Food Pantry Donations" in the Church narthex on the table outside of Pollard Hall.

Toiletries

Full-sized and "courtesy" sized bars of soap, shampoo, and conditioner, and shower caps are donated to various causes. Place on the pew inside Pollard Hall.

Sneaker Project

Place used pairs of sneakers (any size) on the pew inside Pollard Hall. They are sent to the Somerset Food Bank and other charities.

Eyeglasses, Sunglasses, Cell Phones

Place used glasses and cell phones on the pew inside Pollard Hall.

Yarn & Fabric

Yarn is used to make lap robes for wounded veterans, afghans for battered women, and hats for newborns in hospitals; any color is acceptable. Fabric (with the exception of wool and stretchables) of about 1/2 yard is used to make small bears for children, totes for wheelchair patients, etc. Place on pew inside Pollard Hall.
