Pastor's Letter

Perhaps some of you have heard me say recently that I finally "got smart." What I mean by that is that my wife, Barbara, gave me a smart phone for my birthday. Now I can get my life organized and condensed onto this little handheld computer. It is my phone, my calendar, my texting apparatus, my game center, my email, my internet connection, my weather station, my clock, my alarm clock, my camera, my gps, my store, my music player, and other things I don't know about yet – not that I know how to do all the things I mentioned above.



It seems everyone has one of these little "smart" gadgets in their pockets or purses. Wherever you look, you see people perusing or talking on their phone, or taking pictures of one another or selfies. And it is not just in the United States. Recently, I came across an ad for a restaurant in Beirut, Lebanon where, if you surrender your cell phone to the restaurant when you enter, they will take 10% off the cost of the food. Their reasoning is so that patrons will socialize with one another and enjoy the meal cooked for them. Then, they can retrieve their phones on their way out.

Seems like a good idea to me. It also seems like something the church needs to be aware of. Cell phones make it easy for us to be self-absorbed. They make us feel so important that we need to have all of our contacts and other resources available to us at all times. We don't see those around us while we are looking at the little screen. October is a month when we consider the needs of other people -- the hungry, the children, those who suffer from domestic violence -- we even begin the month with World Communion when we sit at Christ's table with Christians from around the world.

I've always felt that the special awareness emphasis of October makes it a time to consider other people--the strangers around us. I hope that you find time to put down your phone and truly communicate with others during this month and every month. Perhaps you can create *off zones* in your life. *Off zones* would be those times and places where you turn your phone off and make yourself present to whatever is happening at that moment. Besides cars, restrooms, and performances, *off places* could also be in restaurants or for quiet times in your life when you can just sit and reflect. The wonderful thing about today's phones is that they have voicemail and caller ID, so when you turn your phone back on you can connect with someone you missed. We need to be connected, but we also need times when we are disconnected so we can notice the person in front of us or notice the person within us.

Sunday, October 5th, is World Communion Sunday! It is a very special communion because it gives our congregation the chance to experience Holy Communion in the context of the global community. There will be different types of bread from various cultures. We hope that you will join us on this special communion day.

The Deacons have decided to participate in a Church World Service program and start a collection at church to make **Emergency Clean-Up Buckets**. These supplies enable people to begin the overwhelming job of cleaning up after a flood, hurricane, tornado, or other disaster here in the United States. **We will begin collecting on October 1**st, and our goal is to make at least ten complete buckets. The list of supplies is below. **The congregation will assemble the buckets after church on October 26**th. Please give supplies to any of the Deacons; and, if you have any questions, ask one of the Deacons. We appreciate any donations of supplies or money to purchase supplies. The buckets are sent out when they are needed. After Hurricane Sandy, buckets were sent to New Jersey to help us recover from the disaster.

- √ 5-gallon bucket with resealable lid
- ✓ 5 scouring pads
- √ 7 sponges (assorted sizes)
- ✓ scrub brush
- √ 18 cleaning towels (like Easy Wipes)
- ✓ 50-78 oz. box of dry laundry detergent
- ✓ 12 oz. bottle of liquid concentrated household cleaner (like *Lysol*)
- ✓ 24-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap (like *Dawn*)
- √ pkg. 48-50 clothespins
- ✓ 100 ft. or 2 50 ft. of clothesline
- √ 5 dust masks
- ✓ 2 prs. latex gloves
- ✓ pair of work gloves
- ✓ 24-28 heavy duty 30-45 gallon trash bags
- ✓ 6-9 oz. bottle of insect repellent (pump, drops, or lotion not aerosol)



Ongoing Mission Programs

Road to Bridges

Change (and more) collected during coffee hour supports Bridges Program, providing 40 lunches per month for NJ/NY homeless.

Township Food Pantry

Items can be left in baskets labeled "Food Pantry Donations" in the Church narthex and on the table outside of Pollard Hall.

Toiletries

Full-sized and "courtesy" sized bars of soap, shampoo, and conditioner, and shower caps are donated to various causes. Place on the pew inside Pollard Hall.

Sneaker Project

Place used pairs of sneakers (any size) on the pew inside Pollard Hall. They are sent to the Somerset Food Bank and other charities.

Eyeglasses, Sunglasses, Cell Phones

Place used glasses and cell phones on the pew inside Pollard Hall.

Yarn & Fabric

Yarn is used to make lap robes for wounded veterans, afghans for battered women, and hats for newborns in hospitals; any color is acceptable. Fabric (with the exception of wool and stretchables) of about 1/2 yard is used to make small bears for children, totes for wheelchair patients, etc. Place on pew inside Pollard Hall.
