Pastor's Letter

In the past several weeks, we've had several events in our nation that have reminded us of how difficult life is for some people in our nation. With the suicide of comedian Robin Williams, who was suffering from severe depression, and the killing of the 18 year old unarmed black man, Michael Brown, in Ferguson, MO, and the subsequent riots, we are reminded that many people in this country are feeling a lot of pain and fear. With the riots, many of us fear we are headed into another 1960's kind of scenario. We also hear that suicides are a higher cause of death in our country than auto accidents. In 2013, there were 38,364 deaths by suicide.

What these two seemingly separate incidents have in common is that we have a number of people who feel that there is no way out of their suffering and their fear. They cannot find relief from their depression, and they cannot find a path to respectability and sustainability for their lives because they are stuck in low paying jobs, or they cannot find jobs, or they are not thought of as human. It also seems that Washington is stuck playing their political games and cannot, or will not, do anything to help the plight of these people who are suffering. We wonder – what can the church do to help alleviate this suffering and fear?

We can do a lot. We can and must stand up for the basic rights of people to be able to work and earn a wage that sustains their lives. They should not work a full-time job and then have to go on welfare to have enough to live or to have health insurance. We must stand up and demand respect for all people no matter the color of their skin, or how poor or rich they are, or any other human distinction we have devised. The church really is about the only institution that can do this. If you think of the times that Jesus lived with us, the Hebrew people were a beaten and depressed people because of the Roman occupation of Israel and Judah. People were fearful of the Romans, of the Jewish hierarchy and priesthood, because they were not helping much, and were much more concerned with keeping the laws in order to keep peace; but, many suffered under these laws. Into this came Jesus, preaching that he had come to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.

We need to reclaim that mandate for ourselves and our church. The times demand it, and God is calling for it. It might mean we need to stand in the breach between warring parties and demand that, in the name of the God we worship, they stop. It might mean we need to be with someone who is suffering and just be there with them and for them that they might make it through. We might need to march in solidarity with those who are suffering that through us their voice might be heard. We must remind everyone that each and every person is a beloved child of God. They are beloved even if they don't believe the same as we do. When we see someone being demeaned in a store or on the street, we must have the courage to say *stop*. These are the marks of a Christian. This is how we live the message of Christ. We cannot go backwards. We must continue to push forward and do our part in creating the Kingdom of God on earth. Perhaps we can help spread the news by sharing our belief in justice for all of God's people at the Stirling Street Fair on September 21st.

Back-to-School Shopping?

Help our Sunday School students with a hands-on Mission project to remind them (and us) about those who aren't in a position to just go out and buy what's needed for school. **Church World Service <u>School Kits</u>** help to provide basic school supplies for students who can't afford them or who have been affected by disasters.

As you go about your shopping in the coming weeks, watch for those sales, and help us to gather the supplies for a dozen (or more) kits. These are the items needed to assemble one School Kit:

- One pair of blunt metal scissors (rounded tip)
- Three 70-count spiral notebooks totaling 200-210 pages (no loose-leaf or filler paper)
- One 30-centimeter ruler (12")
- One hand-held pencil sharpener
- One large eraser
- Six new pencils with erasers
- One box of 24 crayons (only 24)
- One 12" x 14" to 14" x 17" finished-size cotton or lightweight canvas bag with cloth handles (Please, no reusable shopping bags or backpacks.)



Those who like to sew may help by making bags. Each takes ½ yard of fabric. Copies of the pattern will be available at church, and it's also included on page 8 of this newsletter.

Supplies will be received at church on Sunday, Sept. 7th. Financial donations are also greatly appreciated to fill in needed supplies and to fund the processing/shipping costs (\$2 per kit). The children will put the kits together after church on Sept. 21st.

At its June meeting, the Deacons made the decision to participate in a Church World Service (CWS) Emergency Clean-up Bucket mission. On **October 5**th, **World Communion Sunday**, **we will put the clean-up kits together during coffee hour**. A list will be posted on the Deacons board in Pollard Hall of what we need to put in the buckets. You can sign-up to donate items that are needed. Cash donations to purchase items that are not donated and to ship the kits to CWS will also be collected. We hope you will help us with this important mission project. The items we will be collecting are:

- √ 5-gallon bucket with resealable lid
- √ 5 scouring pads
- √ 7 sponges (assorted sizes)
- ✓ scrub brush
- √ 18 Easy wipes
- ✓ 50-75 oz. box of dry laundry detergent
- √ 12 oz. bottle of liquid concentrated household cleaner (like Lysol)
- ✓ 24-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap (like Dawn)
- ✓ pkg. 48-50 clothespins
- ✓ 100 ft. of clothesline
- ✓ 5 dust masks
- √ 2 prs. latex gloves
- ✓ pair of work gloves
- ✓ box of 24-28 heavy duty 30-45 gallon trash bags
- ✓ 6-9 oz. bottle of insect repellent (pump, drops, or lotion not aerosol)



Directions for sewing a school bag for the CWS School Kit project:

SCHOOL BAG PATTERN

MATERIALS NEEDED:

1/2 yd of "child-friendly" fabric

MAKE THE BAG:

Cut two pieces of fabric 13" X 17"

Place the two pieces together, right sides together, and sew a 1/2" seam down one side, across the bottom, and up the other side, leaving the top open.

Turn the bag so the seam is in the inside.

Turn under 1/2" on the top edge and press.

Turn under 2" at the top edge to form a hem and stitch.



MAKE THE HANDLES:

Cut two pieces of fabric 4" X 22"

Fold in half one of the 4" X 22" pieces with right sides together. Stitch with a 1/2" seam allowance and turn inside out, **or** turn under and press ½" on long side of fabric. Fold wrong sides together. Top stitch close to edge. Press.

Repeat for the second handle. Press.

Turn under raw edges and stitch to the top of the bag.

Finished bag will be approximately 12" X 14". Place CWS School Kit items in bag.

Ongoing Mission Programs

Road to Bridges

Change (and more) collected during coffee hour supports Bridges Program, providing 40 lunches per month for NJ/NY homeless.

Township Food Pantry

Items can be left in baskets labeled "Food Pantry Donations" in the Church narthex and on the table outside of Pollard Hall.

Toiletries

Full-sized and "courtesy" sized bars of soap, shampoo, and conditioner, and shower caps are donated to various causes. Place on the pew inside Pollard Hall.

Sneaker Project

Place used pairs of sneakers (any size) on the pew inside Pollard Hall. They are sent to the Somerset Food Bank and other charities.

Eyeglasses, Sunglasses, Cell Phones

Place used glasses and cell phones on the pew inside Pollard Hall.

Yarn & Fabric

Yarn is used to make lap robes for wounded veterans, afghans for battered women, and hats for newborns in hospitals; any color is acceptable. Fabric (with the exception of wool and stretchables) of about 1/2 yard is used to make small bears for children, totes for wheelchair patients, etc. Place on pew inside Pollard Hall.
