# Pastor's Letter

At our June Fourth Sunday Focus gathering, Tom Parziale led us in a discussion of compromise. One of the things we all pretty much agreed on was that compromise is an art, and it seems that fewer and fewer people have it. We live in a day and age when many people are saying it is "my way or the highway." This is especially true in the area of politics, and also, to a degree, in the area of religion. Many people are having problems living with the diversity we have in our country and world today.



I believe this is not just a problem of discourse, but it is a spiritual problem as well. It is a spiritual problem in that we have difficulty in seeing the person we disagree with as a good human being, beloved by God, unless they agree with our viewpoint. It is an issue of our being right rather than being loving. This is the thinking that nailed Jesus to the cross. The Jewish leaders of Jesus' day were more about being right than seeing the loving actions of Jesus.



I bring all of this up because I believe the action taken at the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA), that just concluded in Detroit, MI, regarding same sex marriages in the Presbyterian Church was one of compassionate compromise. It allows pastors and churches in states where same sex marriages are legal, and who in good conscience believe that same-sex couples should be able to marry, are now able to perform those weddings. However, if pastors and churches in good conscience do not believe that they should marry, they do not have to do them and cannot be forced to marry them. What we are saying is that the relationships we have in our connectional church are more important than forcing others to accept our viewpoint.

We need more of this respect for the viewpoints of others in our lives. While we may not agree with the other viewpoint, we have to respect it for the person who believes it. At the same time, we have to be willing to reach compassionate compromises or else we will stagnate and become bitter in our stubbornness. This is what I see happening in the politics of our time. The Church of Jesus Christ needs to model to the country and the world how we can reach compassionate compromises. I hope we can recover that art before it is too late.



I also hope you all have a great summer. And, if your read any good books, please let me know about them!


### Fish & Chips Fundraising Dinner

# Gifts of Men Sunday

On June 15<sup>th</sup>, we celebrated Gifts of Men Sunday by recognizing two church members who continue to make contributions to our church and the community--Ed Gerecht and Israel Sierra. Following the service, the Worship Committee hosted a special fellowship hour in their honor.

<u>Ed Gerecht</u> is a "home-grown" guy, having been born and raised in Long Hill Twp. He grew up on Chestnut St. in Stirling and now lives in Millington with his wife, Susan, and children, Matthew and Amanda.



His dedication to the community goes back many years. He joined the Millington Volunteer Fire Dept. in 1974 and continues to serve as well as being a Trustee and the Treasurer. He was a member of the Millington First Aid Squad until they merged with the TOP Squad in 1980. Growing up in town, he played on the Little League and later coached both baseball and softball when his children played.

Ed has been practicing law since 1986 and has always been available to assist the church and members of the congregation with legal matters. He served 3 years on the Board of Education and has been on the Board of Adjustment since 2006. He has been a member of CERT (Citizens Emergency Response Team) since its inception in 2005. One of Ed's main interests is Boy Scouts, and he is the Chartered Organization Representative for our church for Troop 59 and has been a Scout Leader since 2000. In 1991, Ed joined the church and has been busier than ever. He has served two terms for a total of 12 years on Session, and he is on the Personnel and Buildings & Grounds Committees. He participates in adult study groups, including Fourth Sunday Focus, Book Study, and Joint-Church Study Soup Suppers and Summer Series.

When asked what he does in his spare time, Ed laughed. He says he likes to take walks and bicycle, but doesn't have much time. He also said he just got a new bike, so here's hoping he finds some free time to take it out for a spin.

<u>Israel Sierra, Jr.</u> was born in New York City's East Village and lived there for the first 30 years of his life. He moved to NJ in 1982 and to Stirling in 2003.

Israel worked for the Millburn Fire Department and retired in 2008. He was a volunteer with the Stirling Fire Dept. from 2003 - 2008. In 2008, he joined the Long Hill First Aid Squad (formerly TOPS). Israel is a member of CERT (Citizens Emergency Response Team) and is part of CERT's MRC (Medical Reserve Corp).



After attending our church for several years, Israel became a member in 2010 and has been kept very busy. Starting in June, cell phone numbers will go public, which means they are being released to telemarketing companies. Then you will start receiving lots of sales calls on your cell phone as well as your home phone, and you will probably be charged for them! You can remove your cell phone number for 5 years by calling: 888-382-1222 - provided by the Federal Trade Commission. You must call from the number you wish to block.

# **Ongoing Mission Programs**

#### Road to Bridges

Change (and more) collected during coffee hour supports Bridges Program, providing 40 lunches per month for NJ/NY homeless.

#### **Township Food Pantry**

#### **Toiletries**
