# Pastor's Letter



A man had a heart attack and was rushed to the hospital. He could receive little company and was not to be excited. While he was in the hospital, a rich uncle died and left him a million dollars. His family wondered how to break the news to him with the least amount of excitement. It was decided to ask the preacher if he would go and break the news quietly to the man. The preacher went and gradually led up to a question. The preacher asked the patient what he would do if he inherited a million dollars. He said, "I think I would give half of it to the church." The preacher dropped dead.

I have a running joke when I see people playing bingo or running a 50/50 -- I remind people that they need to remember that the church gets 50%. I've even done it when the chorus I am in runs a 50/50 among the chorus members.



Over the past year, we have sent out a number of requests for money for the church budget for some of the building projects we have had to accomplish, and people have responded. Since November, we have spent over \$101,000 dollars to put a new roof over the office wing, a new roof on the steeple, replace the parking lot, and install new carpet in the choir/parlor room and the childcare room.

We did all of this and only had to borrow \$30,000 from our Endowment Fund. People came through, and we also had money we had been saving for a "rainy day." We used a large amount of the voucher fund to help pay for the roof. We received several large checks for the parking lot, we received several checks from the insurance company, and people have been giving money over time to the roof fund. These projects are done, and there is nothing big on the horizon that needs to be done. And we did all of this as we struggled to keep the operating fund of the church solvent.

God has been with us and watching over us. Now we need to work to answer the question, "Now that the major work on the building and grounds is done, what are we going to do with it?" As I often say, it is not about us. It is not about keeping things nice for ourselves. It is about keeping these resources up so that we can use them to minister to others. How can we use our nice facilities to feed those who are hungry? I hope you will help us respond to that question.



## **Ongoing Mission Programs**

#### Road to Bridges

Change (and more) collected during coffee hour supports Bridges Program, providing 40 lunches per month for NJ/NY homeless.

#### Township Food Pantry

Items can be left in baskets labeled "Food Pantry Donations" in the Church narthex and on the table outside of Pollard Hall.

#### **Toiletries**

Yam is used to make lap robes for wounded veterans, afghans for battered women, and hats for newborns in hospitals; any color is acceptable.
