Pastor's Letter

While visiting the big gothic cathedrals in Cologne, Strasbourg, Speyer, and Heidelberg, I was reminded of the fact that the church was the place where ones eyes were lifted heavenward by the mere suggestion of the architecture. Yet, the priests in those medieval times were the only ones educated enough to read and understand the Bible, or any other writing for that matter. They had all of the books as well. In Strasbourg, there was a statue of Gutenberg with a small printing press, because he invented the printing press and movable type while living there. Gutenberg started printing books and papers and his own Gutenberg Bible, which was written in Latin, in Mainz, Germany around 1445. Shortly after that, in 1522, Martin Luther translated the New Testament into German so that the common people could read it. Luther finished the entire Bible in 1534. Because of the printing press, Luther was able to get copies of the Bible out to people quickly.


The people now had the Bible, but could they understand it? Did they understand the different viewpoints of the different writers? Did they understand the use of fact, myth, legend, and stories used in writing the Bible? These are the people who, prior to this time, could only learn about the life of Christ and the Bible by looking at the pictures in the stained glass windows of the cathedrals. Most of the cathedrals I visited had large stained glass windows that told the stories of the Bible in pictures. That was the only way people could study the stories of the Bible. They hungered for the real account, and some of the early Bible translators paid with their lives for translating the scriptures into a language other than Latin - the holy language, according to the ancient Roman Church.

I share all of this with you as we look ahead to September when we start our youth Christian Education program up again. I want to do a Bible Study during a regular time of the day each week – in the morning or evening. So often we think we know the Bible, but as I mentioned in the Wednesday night summer class about how our spirituality changes as we get older, as we mature we read the stories at a deeper level, and we get into understanding the background of the Biblical accounts. It was a big thing to put the Bible into the hands of the people. We honor their faith and strength when we take the time to read it and study it. Please let me know if you would like to be a part of such a study and what book or part of the Bible you would like to study. The physical church is only holy when the word is read, studied, and lived in it and outside of it.

We will celebrate Rally Day, the beginning of our Church School program, on Sunday, September 13th, during morning worship.

News from Bridges:

In June, we received a thank-you letter from *Bridges*. In the letter, they offered the following:

Since we opened the doors at Project Connect in March 2014, we have assisted over 1,600 homeless people who are motivated to change their lives for the better. *Bridges* received a grant to partner with St. John's Soup Kitchen in Newark and, as a result, we have been able to hire a few people to assist homeless Vets and others obtain jobs and housing. To illustrate the impact this program has had on the life of one single mother and her family, the following is quoted:

"I'm a single mother of five children, two of whom have special needs, and I work part-time to support us. Earlier this year our rental apartment was foreclosed on, and we were suddenly homeless. I sought assistance from the Mayor's office, but they simply referred me to other agencies, none of which could help me. The Department of Welfare, and every other Newark agency and shelter, turned me away because I don't receive monthly financial assistance, and they wouldn't be reimbursed for assisting me. My son, who struggles with an anxiety disorder, was particularly affected by the uncertainty of not having a home. I hid it from my children, but I, too, was very frightened.

"Our situation improved suddenly when I received a call from Project Connect's manager. She and the staff made phone calls until they found an agency that would provide a few months of rental assistance. Next, they connected me with a realtor who waived the commission and search fees, and helped me find an affordable apartment.

"We're so happy in our new home. The rental assistance has helped me save money for my family's future, and put us on more solid financial ground. Project Connect stepped in when every other agency turned me away; I don't know where we'd be today if they hadn't reached out to me. Today, my son doesn't have to cope with uncertainty and my family has a clean, safe and secure home. I'll always be grateful to Project Connect."

Ongoing Mission Programs

Road to Bridges

Change (and more) collected during coffee hour supports Bridges Program, providing 40 lunches per month for NJ/NY homeless.

Township Food Pantry

Items can be left in baskets labeled "Food Pantry Donations" in the Church narthex and on the table outside of Pollard Hall.

Toiletries

Full-sized and "courtesy" sized bars of soap, shampoo, and conditioner, and shower caps are donated to various causes. Place on the pew inside Pollard Hall.

Sneaker Project

Place used pairs of sneakers (any size) on the pew inside Pollard Hall. They are sent to the Somerset Food Bank and other charities.

Eyeglasses, Sunglasses, Cell Phones

Place used glasses and cell phones on the pew inside Pollard Hall.

Yarn & Fabric

Yam is used to make lap robes for wounded veterans, afghans for battered women, and hats for newborns in hospitals; any color is acceptable. Fabric (with the exception of wool and stretchables) of about 1/2 yard is used to make small bears for children, totes for wheelchair patients, etc. Place on pew inside Pollard Hall.
