# Pastor's Letter

As I write this, the 2016 Olympics has just ended. The international games and hoopla are over. I did not watch much of the Olympics this year; I enjoy the winter version more than the summer version. However, the Olympics was not without its distractions, and most of it had nothing to do with Rio or Brazil hosting the games. Before the Olympics started, we heard horror stories of how the venues were not safe or, in some cases, not ready. We heard of security forces not having the time needed to practice security. We heard of the mosquito

problem with the Zika virus. Yet, after all was said and done, the games came off very well. We only had the issues of the green water in the diving pool and a few other problems. The bigger problems were with the athletes themselves. We heard of athletes assaulting and harassing people. We heard of 4 members of the gold medal swim team filing a false report of being robbed at gunpoint. The story came out later, and is still being investigated, that they were drunk and had busted down a door and caused damage at a gas station.



We live in a time when there is a strong sense of entitlement by many people. I'm not talking about entitlements like health care, etc., but entitlements such as *I am allowed to get drunk and do things to others and their property and not be held responsible for it*. With celebrity comes this feeling of *I can do anything I want and I won't be held responsible because I'm famous*. We've seen it in professional sports players doing things that are destructive and they are not held responsible. I write about this because it seems to be an epidemic in our country with all of its money and celebrities.

If the Bible teaches us one thing, it is that we are personally responsible for our actions that hurt others. Jesus chastised the Jewish hierarchy of his day because they talked about caring for the people, but then they would do things like allowing for temple currency to be exchanged at a rate that brought in profit to the temple and priests. They talked about the sanctity of life and then allowed people to be stoned for not following the laws. The Gospel of Jesus Christ was about respect and love for each and every person, for all of our neighbors.

Each week we come to church to be reminded that we are all equal in God's sight. We come to worship the one who calls us to love our neighbors as ourselves. When we are bombarded day in and day out with the ways of the word that say "*We are entitled*," "*You have to take care of yourself*," we need a time to come and be touched by the grace and truth of Christ. We can be thankful that Jesus, the Christ, the anointed one of God, was like he was. I recall the words of Jesus when disciples of John the Baptist came to Jesus asking if he was the one or should they look for another. "*Go and tell John what you have seen and heard: the* 



blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, the poor have good news brought to them. And blessed is anyone who takes no offense at me."

As we begin our 2016-2017 program year, let us work to be in touch with Jesus and his way so that we can be in the world, but not of the world.


Nolen's family invites everyone to attend a luncheon in Pollard Hall following the service. Please plan to join us for this joyous celebration.


#### **Mission Offering in September**

#### SAVE THE DATE: Sunday, October 16<sup>th</sup> - To Take a Walk to End Hunger


