

# Pastor's Letter

We have now entered the season of Easter or, what we used to call, *Eastertide*. It is recognition that the resurrection was such a big event that we need a whole season to plumb the riches of the resurrection experience. The scripture readings during this season are all from the New Testament as Easter marks the beginning of the break away from Judaism. It still takes over a hundred years for the early church to begin to materialize. It wasn't until the time of the Roman



Emperor Constantine (Emperor from 306-337) that the church began to become the Christian Church. The scriptures for the season of Easter tell of the teachings and struggles that the disciples and the Christian faith went through in order to later become the Church.

In that very early time, much of the work was deciding what to believe. As you can imagine, people had different ideas regarding what Jesus was all about. Three of the gospels were written approximately 60 years after his death. The earliest, Mark, was written approximately 40 years after his death. There were also many other gospels and writings about Jesus and the faith that came along later and were refuted as heresies. There was also this new sect called *People of the Way* (later Christianity) that was hated and persecuted by Jews and Romans for different reasons. The season of Easter contains all of this. It speaks powerfully to the Church in our time as we struggle to define what it means to be the Church of Jesus Christ. Is it to believe and have faith in Jesus? Is it to do the works that Jesus did for the outcasts of society? Is it our job to purify the Church, or are we to let Jesus take care of that? This season and its readings are designed to help us answer some of those questions.

I hope you will you will join us as we explore these questions and more during this season of Easter.


The event includes music (featuring our own Ross Griswold), a silent auction, and live hawks and owls.

New Jersey's Hawks, by Len Soucy



# Remembering Rev. James MacKellar

As was noted in the April issue of Stirling Stuff, Rev. James MacKellar, who was the pastor of our Church from 1965-1976, passed away on March 24<sup>th</sup> in Vermont at the age of 85. Following are some highlights of a life well lived:

Rev. MacKellar was born in 1931 Wilkes- Barre, PA. His family lived in the New York City area briefly, and then moved to River Edge, NJ. He graduated from Hackensack HS and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree, with a major in Philosophy, from Cornell University.



That was followed by a Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary. While at Cornell, he met his wife of 61 years, Eugenia (Gene). They raised three children and have five grandchildren.

He was ordained to the Presbyterian ministry in 1955. He served as Pastor of Presbyterian churches in Dryden, NY; Waverly, NY; Stirling, NJ; and, Lyons Falls, NY, and as Interim Pastor of the East Craftsbury, VT, Presbyterian Church. In 1970, he was elected Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Newton. In 1975, he was elected Stated Clerk of the Synod of the Northeast, an office he held until he retired in 1996. He served on many committees and councils of the Presbyteries of Cayuga-Syracuse, Binghamton, Newton, Utica, and Northern New England and the Synods of New York, New Jersey, and the Northeast. He became a Registered Parliamentarian and was recognized as a dependable advisor on parliamentary procedure.

Rev. MacKellar served six years on the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA), the denomination's ecclesiastical Supreme Court. Then he served six years on the General Assembly's Advisory Committee on the (Church's) Constitution, four as its moderator. In 2004, he was the second person to receive the Constitutional Service Award. He had a life-long interest in inter-church relations and served as President of the Vermont Ecumenical Council and Bible Society and chaired ministerial associations in Tompkins County, NY; the Waverly area; Watchung Hills, NJ; and, Lewis County, NY. He represented the Presbyterian Church on the Board of the NJ Council of Churches and the Church Plan Association for the New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut Metropolitan Area.

For 20 years, Rev. MacKellar was active as a volunteer counselor and director of church camp programs for teenagers. He believed that service to the community was an important part of his ministry. He was a 14-gallon blood donor and served on the boards of Red Cross chapters in Waverly, NY; the Summit Area, NJ; and, Newport, VT. Following the example of his parents, he was active in first aid squads, was a charter member and first Captain of the Township of Passaic First Aid Squad (now the Long Hill First Aid Squad). He was Moderator of the Town of Newport, VT, 1993- 2002.

Over a thirty-year period, he and Gene raised nineteen guide dog puppies for The Seeing Eye. From his childhood in the Kingston, PA, Presbyterian Church, choral music was important to his spiritual life and ministry. He loved to sing hymns and encouraged his congregations to sing. He sang in choirs and community choral groups, often as tenor soloist. He was a member of the Princeton Theological Seminary touring choir for a year and a half and, with that choir, sang for many military and mission installations in Korea and Japan for two months in 1953. In the past [25] years, he sang with Northsong and some years with the Northeast Kingdom Chorus.

He liked the verse of "What Wondrous Love Is This" that says:

"And when from death I'm free, I'll sing on.

And when from death I'm free, I'll sing and joyful be,

And through eternity I'll sing on, I'll sing on."

A memorial service will be held in the East Craftsbury Presbyterian Church on May 6th at 11:00 a.m. In lieu of flowers, memorial gifts may be sent to the Church at 1097 Ketchum Hill Rd., Craftsbury, VT 05826, or to The Seeing Eye, P.O. Box 375, Morristown, NJ 07963
