Pastor's Letter

On Sunday, June 18^{th} , Father's Day, I talked about the importance of laughter. A statistic I shared that I found startling was that children 7 and under laugh about 150 times a day. There is a legend that they laugh on average of 300 times a day, but no one can find the research that backs up this statistic. Adults laugh on average 15-17 times a day. Adults are way too serious.



It got me to thinking about the anger and poison in the relationships in our country today. Could it be that we are not laughing enough? Research has shown that relationships where both parties laugh a lot are better and stronger than those where the parties do not laugh a lot. According to research, this is true in marriages as well. This laughter is not laughing at each other but with each other, at the foibles of our selves.



Living in a family with a member who does some stand-up comedy and a lot of improv comedy, I have the luxury of enjoying laughter often. Of course, it is going to be hard when Ali goes to seminary this August. Barbara and I will have to find ways to create our own laughter and comedy. All of this leads me to wonder if there are ways to raise the number of times we laugh in a day.

In my sermon, I talked about how seeing the incredulous things God does in the world today through

human people causes me to laugh. So, we need to look at what is happening around us in our daily lives, and celebrate the joy and laughter that those things bring about. We can also immerse ourselves in humor. Read funny books, watch comedians on Netflix (although some are better and more wholesome than others), watch funny movies. There are a lot of things we can do to raise our daily laughter numbers. I shared how Norman Cousins was diagnosed with an incurable disease. He checked himself out of the hospital, got a movie projector, and watch old Marx Brothers and Candid Camera films. It not only made him feel better -- it also reversed his incurable disease.





During the *dog days of summer*, try to find ways to laugh and just enjoy your life. That's my prescription for a hot summer.

Our Church has a subscription for multiple copies of this devotional booklet; they are available on the table in the Church narthex.


Labels/Box Tops for Education; Pop-Top Can Tabs
