Pastor's Letter

Is Spring going to get here? I'm a little more hopeful today as the temperature is going up to the mid-fifties. Hope springs eternal. However, I am aware that on Saturday, April 14, the temperature was in the low 80's and then on Sunday it was back down in the 30's and 40's. The flowers are definitely going into the ground later this year.



I thought of this as I reflected on the Day of Pentecost that we will celebrate on May 20<sup>th</sup>. Pentecost is when we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit. Until the 4<sup>th</sup> century AD Pentecost was a celebration of Ascension Day, the day Christ ascended to be with God <u>and</u> the coming of the Holy Spirit. During the 4<sup>th</sup> century the two were moved apart and celebrated each separately. Ascension Day is now celebrated on the Thursday 10 days before Pentecost. Pentecost, meaning "the fiftieth day," is held on the fiftieth day after Easter. It has a connection in Judaism as it refers to the festival celebrated on the fiftieth day after <u>Passover</u>, also known as the "Feast of Weeks" (a harvest festival) in the <u>Septuagint</u>, the early Greek version of the Old Testament.

It is interesting because a connection can be made between the meaning of Pentecost in the Jewish tradition and the Christian tradition. As I said, in the Jewish tradition the Feast of Weeks or Pentecost was a celebration of the bounty of the winter harvest. In the Christian understanding Pentecost was when the disciples, infused with the Holy Spirit, went into the world and the church began to spread to the four corners of the world. In Acts 2:41 we read that on the first Pentecost "about three thousand" people were baptized and brought into the fellowship. In Luke 10:2 we hear Jesus say, "the harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few." Remember, the author of Luke wrote both the gospel and the book of Acts where we find the Pentecost story. We get the sense that the author was celebrating the Spirit that began to grow the church.

Often, we talk about Pentecost being the "birthday of the church." However, this really does a disservice to the power of the movement started by Jesus through the disciples. Pentecost was a day when fear and trembling was cast aside, and courage and purpose was taken on by the disciples. Whether you believe the story as it is actually recorded, or you believe that the disciples had a eureka moment together in the upper room, the truth is they became filled with power and conviction. They took on the mantle that Christ had left for them and gave birth to the movement that would eventually become the Christian Church.

I hope you will join us for our Pentecost celebration on Sunday, May 20<sup>th</sup>. Wear red as a sign of the Spirit God has given you and your passion to share the Gospel of Christ to the world.

#### Mission of the Month -



The Deacons are working with the Church World Service (CWS) and their "Blanket Month Appeal" for our mission of the month. In 2017, CWS distributed thousands of woolen blankets throughout the world. #### Fellowship Hour



Recently Toni Hopcraft and I delivered a carload of men's clothing to the *Bridges Outreach Program* in Summit. The clothing was donated by *Wilson Church's* thrift shop (The Frippery).

As a result of that visit, we decided we will collect <u>only seasonal men's casual clothing</u> until further notice. Toni delivers the lunches we make once a month and will take whatever clothing we have gathered in the meantime. Suggestions: jeans, work type pants, T-shirts, sweaters, lightweight jackets, sneakers, casual shoes.

When we delivered the clothing, the workers were getting ready that evening for the two stops they would make in New York. We asked how many people they could expect to serve, and they told us a minimum of 60 per stop. They have a very busy operation going in their Summit quarters, where the homeless come to take showers and collect food, particularly at the end of the month when their money runs low.

You can be assured your food and monetary contributions are much needed and appreciated. And now we can add good used clothing for the needy!
