Pastor's Letter

CHRIST THE LORD



<u> April 2020</u>

In his book, A Letter of Consolation, the late Roman Catholic priest, Henri J. Nouwen, shares the letter he wrote to his father after Henri's mother died. It starts out as follows.

Next Monday it will be half a year since mother died. It will be Holy Week and both of us will be preparing ourselves to celebrate Easter. How will this Easter be for us? You will be in the parish church of our little Dutch town listening to the story of Christ's resurrection. I will read that same story to monks and guests in a Trappist monastery in upstate New York. Both of us will look at the Easter candle, symbol of the risen Christ, and think not only of him, but also of her... But I'm sure that we both shall think about last's year's Easter when she was still with us. We shall both remember how she loved this great feast and how she decorated the house with flowers and the dinner table with purple and yellow ribbons.

This year Easter is going to be very different. With the numbers for the coronavirus still rising, it is highly unlikely we will be back in our church for Easter. It will not be the same. With social distancing and quarantines, Easter may feel more like Good Friday than Easter. Because of that, I encourage you to prepare for Easter this year by remembering past years when you had flowers and nicely decorated tables holding a fantastic feast to celebrate the feast of the resurrection. Perhaps you could even decorate in the same manner as you remember.

On Easter we look back to the resurrection of Jesus to find hope and joy for the present and future. I suggest that we do the same this year. On Easter we shout the ancient greeting, *He is risen!* -- words filled with the promise of hope for all of God's people, words that this year will remind us that Covid-19 does not have the last word. We will celebrate Easter online as we worship together. The walls may feel like they are closing in on you, but let yourself remember that Christ busted those walls out when he rose from the dead! Thanks be to God who gives us the victory!


Pachinko is a national obsession of Japan, a dizzying cross between pinball and a slot machine, wherein small metal balls drop randomly amid a maze of brass pins. The urge to play can quickly become an addiction, and of course the game is a perfect metaphor for the ricochet whims of fate. Owning pachinko parlors becomes a way for the clan depicted in the novel to climb out of poverty — but destiny cannot be manipulated so easily.

We are tracing a family dynasty over a sprawl of seven decades. Lee bangs and buffets and pinballs her characters through life, love, and sorrow, somehow making her vast, ambitious narrative seem intimate.

In the early 1900s, teenaged Sunja, the adored daughter of a crippled fisherman, falls for a wealthy stranger at the seashore near her home in Korea. He promises her the world, but when she discovers she is pregnant--and that her lover is married--she refuses to be bought. Instead, she accepts an offer of marriage from a gentle, sickly minister passing through on his

way to Japan. But her decision to abandon her home, and to reject her son's powerful father, sets off a dramatic saga that will echo down through the generations.

Richly told and profoundly moving, Pachinko is a story of love, sacrifice, ambition, and loyalty. From bustling street markets to the halls of Japan's finest universities to the pachinko parlors of the criminal underworld, Lee's complex and passionate characters--strong, stubborn women, devoted sisters and sons, fathers shaken by moral crisis--survive and thrive against the indifferent arc of history.

- ✓ Full-sized and "courtesy"-sized bars of soap, shampoo, conditioner, shower caps
- ✓ Fabric: about ½ yard minimum, to make small bears for children, totes for wheelchair patients, etc. Yarn: to make lap robes for wounded veterans, afghans for battered women, and hats for newborns in hospitals
