Pastor's Letter

Recently, I have been angry. I have been angry at people who are not wearing masks in public and government officials who are opening things up too soon and too fast. I was going to address these issues in a way that would talk about the need for us to wear masks and self-distance as a way of caring for our neighbor. I will admit these concerns and my anger has been out of fear for my son, who is working in a hospital and being run ragged taking care of people with Covid-19. Thankfully, his unit is now starting to receive non-Covid-19 patients as the numbers continue to fall. I am also aware that there could be a second wave, and we could be right back where we have been since the middle of March. I also have had the anger and pain that not only did my daughter not get the graduation she and all of her class at Union Theological Seminary deserved, as do all students graduating this year, but also we were unable to be with her and to hug and share in the joy of the celebration in "normal" ways.



So, as I said, I have been angry this past week. Then, I read the following story in the late Fr. Anthony de Mello's book, *The Song of the Bird*, again.

Dandelions

A man who took great pride in his lawn found himself with a large crop of dandelions. He tried every method he knew to get rid of them. Still they plagued him.

Finally, he wrote to the Department of Agriculture. He enumerated all the things he had tried and closed his letter with this question: *What shall I do now?*

In due course the reply came: *We suggest you learn to love them.*

In a time when we may find ourselves angry and lashing out at those who we feel are putting themselves and others in danger, perhaps we need to be reminded that we need to learn to love them. I know this is true for me right now. We cannot let our fear and anger make us stop loving our brothers and sisters. I will admit that, for me, and I imagine for you as well, it is easier said than done. May God give us the courage and will to, at the very least, make the effort.

These certainly are thoughts we should ponder as we continue our journey through the pandemic.

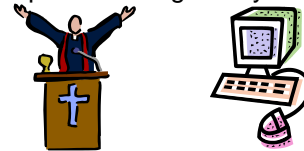

Music During Online Worship

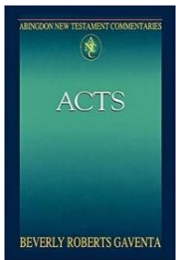
Dear Church Family,

Mission of the Month - June - Local Food Pantry

The Mission of the Month for June will go towards our local Food Pantry at St Vincent's Catholic church across the street from our church. With the current pandemic still hitting many individuals hard, getting food on the table has become extremely difficult for many families. Food Pantries across the nation are being stretched beyond their limits to support their local communities. Please consider giving to this worthy mission to help fund our local Food Pantry. This special offering will be collected throughout the month of June. **Since we are not currently meeting at the church, feel free to send your donation for this mission giving to the church office (158 Central Ave, Stirling, NJ 07980) or directly to Elsie Turqman.** Remember to include your name and/or your envelope number if you would like your donation to be recorded. Thank you in advance for supporting this mission giving.



The two food banks in town, at St. Vincent's and All Saints' Episcopal Church, are becoming depleted and members of the Long Hill community are being asked to donate food items to help restock their shelves. St. Vincent's would welcome **spaghetti and spaghetti sauce, pancake mixes, coffee, tea, white rice, Jello gelatin, macaroni & cheese, cannellini or garbanzo beans (cans), canned vegetables, and dry beans (black, kidney, and pinto)**. You can drop off any food donations directly to St Vincent's church by placing your food items inside the church's vestibule. The doors are always open. Items All Saints' would welcome include, **tuna, white rice, canned soups, canned fruits, and canned veg, jelly, syrup, peanut butter, jelly, cereal, oatmeal, canned tuna or chicken, canned vegetables & fruit, dry goods like beans, flower, rice, pasta, granola bars, apple sauce, diapers, Enfamil formula, soap, toothpaste.** Items for the food pantry may be dropped off between 9:30 AM and 7 PM Monday through Saturday or from Noon to 8 PM on Sunday." Items may be dropped off at the side entrance of the All Saints' church in the food barrel.

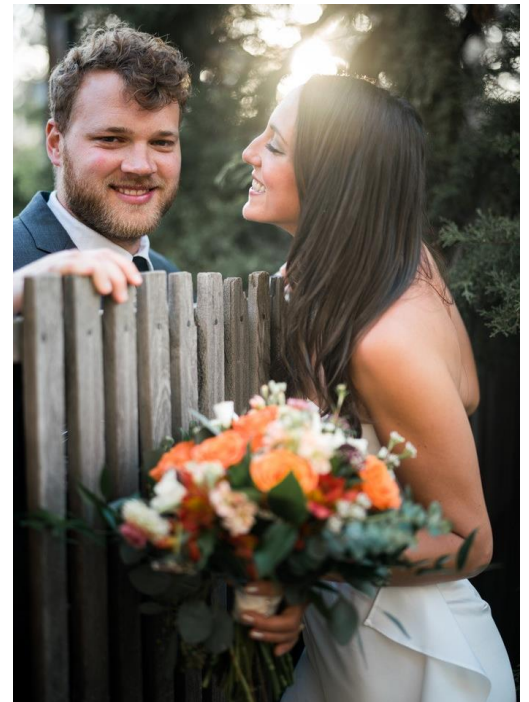

Wedding Congratulations

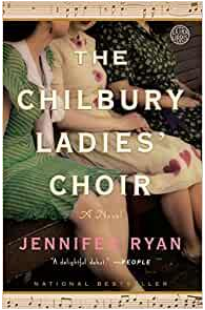
