Pastor's Letter



Recently, I posted on my and our church's Facebook pages a blog by John Pavovitz entitled, *No, This Pandemic Isn't God's Plan.* Here is some of what he said:

Yesterday I read the social media post of a well-known Christian musician, assuring us that the pandemic the planet has been decimated by is, "all part of god's plan." He was prescribing optimism, by saying that the Almighty is engineering these days as a way of bringing humanity closer to him . . .

I don't have any inside information, but my hunch is that an all-powerful, all-knowing, creator who is supposedly made of love—isn't engineering this wide-scale suffering to teach humanity a lesson or to make a point . . .

Instead, I look for god in the way that human beings respond when senseless things happen: when people die too young, when natural disasters come, when pervasive sickness spreads. Instead of spending too much time interpreting the reason such things happen, I watch for the better angels here on the ground: the helpers and the healers and the caregivers and the embracers—and I find meaning there.

One of the things that often occurs when bad things happen is that people begin to do bad theology. They seem to want to find a way to make sense of what is happening, as the Christian musician does in the first paragraph of the quote above. It is easy to see the events of the Hebrew Scriptures where God strikes people dead, or leads armies to glorious victory by slaughtering opposing armies and to think God is like that today. But that is not the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We cannot, and we must not, reconcile the bad things as somehow what God wants. God is in the positive response of people when bad things happen. God is in the words of encouragement, the hugs, the care and support people give to those caught up in whatever bad thing is happening.

Today, during this pandemic, we see God not visiting judgment upon us for allowing abortions, or samesex marriages as has been suggested by some leading evangelical pastors. Rather, we see God in the nurses and doctors run ragged trying to help the flood of people coming into our hospital emergency rooms. We see God in the people who shop for elderly neighbors. We see God in those who sew face masks to give away to those who need them. We see God in the workers in the food chain working hard to keep groceries on the shelves of our supermarkets. These are the kinds of places where God is working. The pandemic is a random act of the world that mutated and caused a virus. God is not in the random act, but in the loving actions that help those caught in the pandemic.

We will be continuing to have our worship services online for the foreseeable future. Please know that all of you are in my prayers and in the prayers of the church. Please be well and be safe.
