I am grateful to our church family for the way you have lived with the protocol of worshiping online and outdoors and meeting via Zoom. I'm grateful for your patience as we figured out how to put services online and have improved over time. I want to thank everyone who has helped to make our online worship services so interesting with guest



Liturgists and Tatiana's piano and organ music. It is also fortunate that we have the capability and the technology to be able to record our services to include special titles, credits, and "follow-along" text on the screen, as well as recorded music against video landscapes. Our online services have been like wine — they improved as they aged in the process of how they have been done.

Now we look forward to starting to get back together in the sanctuary. However, it is not back to normal; we may never get back to the old normal. The best we may be able to do is a new normal. I know we will continue to work together and make this happen. Please call the church and leave a message if you are coming to worship so we can let people know when we go over the maximum number we can have in the sanctuary (22-25 people, depending on family groupings). We will continue to do online recorded services for those who are not ready to be in the sanctuary and for those we may not have room for on Sunday morning. We also ask that you continue to bear with us as we work out the kinks of this new protocol. I will send out the new protocol the week before October 4th.

I know it will boost our spirits to be back in the sanctuary. May God continue to bless our church with health and a wonderful spirit.

Rededication of Memorial Garden

The Memorial Garden Committee is excited to announce that on **Sunday, November 1**st, immediately following church services, there will be a **rededication of the Memorial Garden**. The Memorial Garden has been undergoing a series of updates and improvements. Last year, several dead trees were removed, new plantings were installed, new posts were installed in cement to support the arbors and gates, and some of the bluestone slabs were re-installed. This year, the updates include an expansion of the

garden area beyond the previous border on the Chestnut Street side of the garden, as well as the installation of some new plants and a new irrigation system. The expansion of the garden has allowed for the relocation of some plants to provide more space for them to grow to their full size and provide more privacy in the garden area in the future.

In addition, members of the committee (the team of "Blakeslee and Blakeslee") power washed the side of the church facing the garden to remove unsightly green tree sap and algae. That was followed by a fun time Janet Parziale had painting the arbors, lattices, and gates. We are grateful for Jeff Blakeslee's engineering talents as the doors are now level! Special thanks to Tom Parziale for overseeing all of these tasks and keeping the team on track.



As noted on their website (https://pda.pcusa.org/), "Presbyterian Disaster Assistance enables congregations and mission partners of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to witness to the healing love of Christ through caring for communities adversely affected by crises and catastrophic events." Currently, this organization is working to support victims of Hurricanes Laura and Sally, the Pacific Northwest Fires, and the Iowa Derecho. Each of these disasters has been devastating to many communities, and "PDA funds provide immediate financial support to the

Presbytery's response to the needs of the community in the wake of the disaster. These funds are used in a variety of ways: to support long term recovery work, volunteer rebuilding programs, emotional and spiritual care for leaders and survivors, and other programs, depending on the needs in the community and the gaps left by other responding agencies and groups." Sign-Out a Blue Church Hymnal?

Prior to the sanctuary reopening, all books will be removed from the pews. The Deacons are offering an option for our church members to sign-out a blue hymnal for use at home or to bring back and forth for your own use during worship services each Sunday. The hymnals will be numbered, and the member's name and date book is taken will be recorded on a sheet by a Deacon. Once the pandemic is over, the Deacons will ask those who signed out a hymnal to return it, and the date of return will also be recorded. During the month of October, there will be an opportunity at the end of each service to sign out a book. If you want to sign out a hymnal but will not be attending worship in person, please contact Janet Parziale, and she will arrange to get one to you.

World Communion Sunday



As we move back to indoor services this month, we begin with <u>World Communion Sunday on October 4th</u>. On this Sunday, we celebrate the Lord's Supper with all our sisters and brothers around the world. In the past, we have celebrated communion with Deacons preparing the bread and juice and the Elders serving it to us in our pews. With the current pandemic, our procedures will be a bit different to minimize our interactions. A Deacon, using gloves, will prepare the juice in disposable cups and the bread in mini cupcake holders. The juice will be put directly into the cup holders in the open pews. The bread, in the mini cupcake holders, will be placed on a silver serving tray and set on the communion table. When it is time to serve the

bread, those wishing to participate will be asked to come forward and pick up a cupcake holder with the bread and take it back to their seat. Rev. Peters will lead us through this process during the service.

Reformation Sunday, October 25th


October 25th is Reformation Sunday, the day when Presbyterians celebrate the tradition that grounds their faith. It is always the last Sunday in October, marking the occasion in 1517 when Martin Luther posted his 95 theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany. Martin Luther contributed to major theological reform by translating the Bible into vernacular German, which allowed people to hear and read the gospel of Jesus Christ in their own language. 


In spring 2011, Anthony Shadid was one of four New York Times reporters captured in Libya, cuffed and beaten, as that country was seized by revolution. When he was freed, he went home. Not to Boston or Beirut—where he lives— or to Oklahoma City, where his Lebanese-American family had settled and where he was raised. Instead, he returned to his great-grandfather's estate, a house that, over three years earlier, Shadid had begun to rebuild.

House of Stone is the story of a battle-scarred home and a war correspondent's jostled spirit, and of how reconstructing the one came to fortify the other. In this poignant and resonant memoir, the author creates a mosaic of past and present, tracing the house's renewal alongside his family's flight

from Lebanon and resettlement in America. In the process, Shadid memorializes a lost world, documents the shifting Middle East, and provides profound insights into this volatile landscape. House of Stone is an unforgettable meditation on war, exile, rebirth, and the universal yearning for home.
