



<u>Pastor's Message</u>

As soon as they left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them. Mark 1:29-31



Dear Church Family,

Matthew, Mark, and Luke all tell the story of Jesus healing Simon Peter's mother-in-law. In all three it is a short passage, and in all three we are told that after Jesus healed her of her fever, she got up and served them. I have always thought that this was a bit rough. Couldn't Peter and his wife let her rest a bit after her illness, help her out a little? Was it really necessary that she get up right away to serve them? Didn't she deserve a break?

Commentator Sarah Henrich, however, has some insight into the social world of Jesus' time and the meaning of illness and its costs:

"Illness bore a heavy social cost: not only would a person be unable to earn a living or contribute to the well-being of a household, but their ability to take their proper role in the community, to be honored as a valuable member of a household, town, or village, would be taken from them. Peter's mother-in-law is an excellent case in point. It was her calling and her honor to show hospitality to quests in her home. Cut off from that role by an illness cut her off from doing that which integrated her into her world. Who was she when no longer able to engage in her calling? Jesus restored her to her social world and brought her back to a life of value by freeing her from that fever. It is very important to see that healing is about restoration to community and restoration of a calling, a role, as well as restoration to life. For life without community and calling is bleak indeed."

So, Jesus' healing is not only for the purpose of freedom from illness, its freedom for something as well. We are healed for lives of purpose and meaning and service and generosity and more. And here I mean healing not only from literal illness but healing from the human condition of sin by the life and death and resurrection of Jesus. This is what we remember during this season of Lent.

So perhaps something to be thinking about this Lenten season is for what specific purpose you have been healed. What or who calls to you? Who needs you this week, this month? I expect you don't think about this too much when you just naturally respond to the need of a neighbor or a friend. You think only that you are helping a friend. But, indeed, it is more than that. When you respond with service, with generosity, with encouragement, with patience, you are actually responding to God's call. You have been freed to respond in this way by Christ's healing - whether that healing was of illness or despair or hopelessness or, more generally, of the eternal consequences of our human inclination to miss the mark, to sin.

Presbyterian theologian and preacher, Frederick Buechner: "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet."



In Christ, we have been healed. We have been freed from what ails us so that we can be free for a purpose both as individuals and as a church. May that freedom and that purpose bring joy to each of us, to those we help, and to our church community.

Shared Services with Meyersville Presbyterian Church

The Meyersville Presbyterian Church and the First Presbyterian Church of Stirling will continue to worship together. There will be an online service each week, accessible through a link delivered by email and also available on the church website, <u>www.fpcstirling.org</u>. The service can be viewed at any time. DVD's of the service are also available and may be requested through Janet Parziale.



On Sunday, March 7th, there will be a live Zoom worship service at 10:00 a.m. that will include the Sacrament of the

Lord's Supper. The Zoom link will be sent the day before. It will also be recorded for viewing at a later time.

Holy Week Services

The Worship Committee has been planning our Holy Week worship services. There will be special observances for Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday. All of these services will be available online. We also hope to have some form of additional worship services outdoors – which of course, is difficult to plan as we don't know now what the weather will be like a month from now. Please keep an eye out for announcements about a possible in-person outdoor Maundy Thursday evening communion service and an early Easter morning (7:00 am) worship service at Hillview Farm in Meyersville.



Palm Sunday, March 28th

The service will be recorded at Stirling and palms will be used to decorate the chancel.

Maundy Thursday, April 1st

The service will be recorded at Meyersville and will include a dramatic reading performed by members of both congregations.

Good Friday Vigil, April 2nd

Our Good Friday Vigil will be an opportunity to sit quietly in our beautiful sanctuary and bear witness to Jesus' Good Friday experience. This will be a chance to get away for a few minutes from the hustle of our lives to remember Jesus' Passion and his sacrifice on our behalf. Vigil participants will be welcome to sit, pray, read Scripture, or read devotional material that will be provided.

Entrance into the sanctuary should be through the narthex doors from the outside. There will be instructions and handsanitizer on the table in the narthex and masks will be required. The vigil is from noon to 6 p.m., and participants can sign up for a ½ hour or an hour. There will be only one person (or one household) in the sanctuary at a time. The Days of Holy Week

<u>Palm Sunday</u>: This is the day of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem on a donkey. He was greeted by enthusiastic crowds who shouted, "Hosanna!" and laid palm branches and their cloaks on the pavement before him. This was the traditional way to welcome a royal person to the city.

<u>Maundy Thursday</u>: On Maundy Thursday, we remember Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples, the evening when he washed his disciples' feet and commanded them to "Love one another as I have loved you." The word, "Maundy" comes from the Latin word for "command."

<u>Good Friday</u>: Good Friday is the day when we remember Jesus' death on the cross. We are told that he hung on the cross at Golgotha from noon to 3 and that the curtain in the temple that hid the Holy of Holies was torn from top to bottom. Even though it seems it should be called "Bad Friday" because of Jesus' suffering and death, it was a very good day for all Christians in that it marks the day of Jesus' death and the beginning of a new and different relationship with God.

<u>Easter Sunday or Resurrection Day</u>: This is the greatest day in the life of the world – the day God defeated death and Jesus rose victorious from his grave. His resurrection means that the eternal consequences of human sin are erased, and that we, as Jesus' brothers and sisters, are also welcome to life eternal. Truly a day for celebration!




<u>Helping Out</u>

Earth Hour 2021 is Saturday, March 27th, from 8:30-9:30 p.m.

Earth Hour is a worldwide movement organized by the World Wildlife Fund for Nature (WWF) in 2007. It is observed around the world annually, encouraging individuals, communities, and businesses to <u>turn off non-essential electric lights for</u> <u>one hour, from 8:30 to 9:30 pm, as a symbol of commitment to the planet.</u> The 2021 theme is "Climate Change to Save Earth."

Later this year, world leaders will sit together during major global conferences and set the environmental agenda for the next decade and beyond. They will make crucial political decisions on <u>environmental conditions</u> and sustainable development. These decisions will directly affect the future of humanity and our planet for the years to come.

With everyone's support, <u>Earth Hour 2021 could be the main attention that puts the environment at the center of international conversations</u>. Together we can take responsibility and show the world leaders that the <u>environment</u> <u>matters a lot</u> for everyone. Therefore, immediate actions are needed to reverse the loss of the environment.
