



Dear Church Family,

As we continue on our Lenten journey with Jesus, we remember his triumphant Palm Sunday entrance into the city of Jerusalem. For the people standing by the side of the road, the son of David riding into town on a donkey was truly a moment of celebration and hope for the future. I suppose some folks celebrated because a parade is always a nice change from the everyday, but others rejoiced because they believed that Jesus was indeed sent from God to rescue Jerusalem from the oppression of the Roman occupation.



But the gospels show us that this perspective was inadequate. Matthew, Mark, and Luke all tell us that at the moment of Jesus' death on the cross, the curtain that divided the holiest of sacred areas of the temple from the rest of the temple was torn in two. This was accompanied by an earthquake and midday darkness. This shows us that Jesus had not come to rescue the Jews from the Romans; it was much bigger than that. Jesus brought change to the whole world for all of time. The veil that separated God from God's creation was torn, gone. In Jesus, the world is brought close to God. There is no longer anything that separates us from God.

A Biblical scholar was talking to a group of teenagers about this passage in the Bible and about the meaning of the tearing of the curtain in the temple. He told them that because of Jesus, now we can be close to God. A young man in the group was sitting with his arms folded, looking as disinterested and as bored as he could manage. But, at the teacher's description of the torn curtain, the boy perked up and said:

"That ain't what it means."

"What?" asked the teacher?

"I said, that ain't what it means."

"Well, the Greek word does mean 'rip' or 'tear,'" persisted the teacher.

"It means," said the boy, "that when Jesus died, now God can get to us anytime God wants! Now, nobody's safe!"

When Jesus came to us, we got more than a political revolutionary, more than a fine teacher who told good stories, more than a moral example. In Christ, God walks among us, and nobody is safe. Nobody is safe from the power of forgiveness, from the grace of God, from the love of God, from the challenge of making justice in the world.


We will then celebrate Christ's resurrection with a service in Stirling at 10:00 a.m.



Diorama - 3D Map of Holy Week

Our sermon series for Lent has followed Jesus on his journey through the last week of his earthly life from Palm Sunday through Easter. The gospel of Mark carefully describes what Jesus did and what happened on each of those days. For most of those days, Jesus and his disciples stayed with friends, Mary and Martha, a couple of miles outside the city of Jerusalem, walking each day into the city to turn over the tables in the temple, to engage in verbal confrontations with various folks who wanted to trick and trap him, to have dinner in an upper room.

Thanks to the FPC Worship Committee, we have a **beautiful 3D map or diorama in the sanctuary that portrays the important locations of that last week**. It has been very helpful in contextualizing the events so that we have a sense of both geography and timing and can picture and understand the story as Mark tells it. Many thanks to the Worship Committee! Please be sure to take a look at the display when you have a chance.



The Days of Holy Week - Their Significance

<u>Palm Sunday</u>: This is the day of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem on a donkey. He was greeted by enthusiastic crowds who shouted, "Hosanna!" and laid palm branches and their cloaks on the ground before him. This was the traditional way to welcome a royal person to the city.

<u>Maundy Thursday</u>: On Maundy Thursday, we remember Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples, the evening when he washed his disciples' feet and commanded them to "Love one another as I have loved you." The word, "Maundy" comes from the Latin word for "command."

<u>Good Friday</u>: Good Friday is the day when we remember Jesus' death on the cross. We are told that he hung on the cross at Golgotha from noon to 3 and that the curtain in the temple that hid the Holy of Holies was torn from top to bottom. Even though it seems it should be called "Bad Friday" because of Jesus' suffering and death, it was a very good day for all Christians in that it marks the day of Jesus' death and the beginning of a new and different relationship with God.

<u>Easter Sunday or Resurrection Day</u>: This is the greatest day in the life of the world – the day God defeated death and Jesus rose victorious from his grave. His resurrection means that the eternal consequences of human sin are erased, and that we, as Jesus' brothers and sisters, are also welcome to life eternal. Truly a day for celebration.

Liturgists Needed for Worship Services

For the month of April, we will be worshipping in Meyersville (except for Maundy Thursday); all recordings will be done in Stirling, typically on Thursday early evenings (other arrangements can be made if needed).
