Dear Church Family,

As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." And immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men and followed him. (Mark 1:14-20)



One of gospel writer Mark's favorite words is "immediately." He used it many times in his gospel, and it gives an air of urgency to the story of Jesus' life and ministry. In the story of Jesus' call to the disciples, Simon, Andrew, James, and John, this "immediately" also gives urgency to the disciples' ministry. They didn't stop to think and wonder and weigh alternatives. "Immediately they left their nets and followed him."

This immediate response of those four fishermen is amazing, inspiring, and yet daunting because it sets the bar for discipleship so incredibly high. Leave family, job, home, security to follow an itinerant preacher into an unknown and possibly dangerous future . . . immediately? To be honest, I find it hard to imagine doing this. I expect most people do. I think we would all have serious and sincere reservations about doing this. So, do our reservations make us failures as Christians? Does that mean we are less faithful than Andrew and Peter and James and John? Well, perhaps, but remember that Mark also tells us that those same disciples ended up disappointing, denying, and abandoning Jesus at various points later in the story.

So, what was Mark's point here? By the time he was writing his gospel, it was impossible to follow the earthly Jesus the way those four disciples did. So, what exactly was Mark seeking to inspire? What kind of example did he intend? Presumably Mark's message to his readers in the $1^{\rm st}$ century and to us in the $21^{\rm st}$ is more about following Jesus in a general sense than specifically leaving everything – family, job, home - to traipse along with Jesus through the Galilean countryside.

Except that following Jesus "in a general sense" doesn't really mean anything. We live, work, choose, love, in the particular. We follow Jesus not by literally walking behind him, but in the way we live every day, the priorities we make in our lives. But again, these priorities, this "way we live" has to be expressed in the particular, or to use Mark's "immediately" in a different way, in the immediate.

Merely thinking of ourselves as good people or as Christian believers is not following Jesus. Following Jesus is something that must be done immediately – in the immediate – in the way we interact

with particular people, how we connect person to person, as we help with the new Twelve Baskets Food Pantry, as we pack lunches for NYC street folks, as we reach out to congregation members who are homebound.

I really think the way we let the Holy Spirit enliven us and our church is by listening to what Mark has to say about immediacy, about particularity, about personal connections. Jesus taught the crowds and fed thousands, but he called his disciples one and two at a time - as individual, particular people. And this is how ministry happens; this is how church growth happens; this is how the good news of Jesus Christ is shared – one person at a time, one personal connection, one invitation at a time. We, each one of us, has a word of good news to share. May we, each one of us, be inspired, have the courage, find the will, to speak, to invite, to share with particular, individual people... immediately.

Mission of the Month for February - Super Bowl of Caring

It's that time again: the 56th NFL Super Bowl championship game will be played on Sunday, February 13, and once again it will be an exciting time for football fans. It's also time for the annual Souper Bowl of Caring activities across the United States.

The Souper Bowl of Caring will be the February Mission of the Month. <u>Last year we</u> collected \$390 for this special mission. Remember, the money we collect is donated to organizations close to us.



Some history: in 1990 in South Carolina a simple prayer, "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat" inspired a youth-led movement to help hungry people. This movement has gathered money and food for those in need each year since then. In 2021, the amount of food and monetary donations totaled over \$5,328,000.

For the past few years, we have divided our donations between the Community Foodbank of NJ (Hillside) and Market Street Mission (Morristown). This year the Deacons have chosen to send the entire amount collected to All Saints' Episcopal Church's "Twelve Baskets Food Pantry." Please note: the prices have not yet been established. We will notify you as soon as they are available.


ShopRite Gift Cards

Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, will be on March 2nd this year. There will be an online Ash Wednesday service to be shared that day as well as an in-person service at First Presbyterian Church in Stirling at 7:30 p.m. The focus of traditional Ash Wednesday services is the brevity of life, that we came from dust and will soon enough return back to the earth, dust once more. Considering the couple of years we have all just been through, this is something we are all very well aware of. I am not sure we need too much reminding of this truth.

Another way of thinking about this is that the brevity and uncertainty of life makes this life we have even more precious, inviting us to praise, wonder, and seize the moment. This is the day and let us rejoice in it! What we love is mortal and transitory but, instead of grieving that this year, let's celebrate the things in this world, the people we love, that remind us of the presence of God and God's everlasting love for us. Like Jacob after his dream of the ladder to heaven, Ash Wednesday causes us to pause, notice, wake up, and discover that "God is in this place" and now we know it!

In view of this perspective on Ash Wednesday, one component of this year's online Ash Wednesday service will be a celebration of the people, circumstances, places, and times that have reminded us that "God is in this place." Family Promise of Morris County

There are currently five families in the program, and they are still being housed in motels due to Covid. We have been asked to provide gift cards and/or monetary gifts to help them with the purchase of food and other necessities. <u>Local Food Bank - Twelve Baskets Food Pantry</u>

We are happy to report that the Long Hill Township "Twelve Baskets" Food Pantry has successfully launched with First Presbyterian Church-Stirling (FPC), Meyersville Presbyterian Church (MPC), and All Saints Episcopal Church (ASEC) in Millington working together to open a physical food pantry for Long Hill area residents who are experiencing food insecurity. On Saturday, January 22nd, these efforts culminated in a very successful opening day of the Twelve Baskets Food Pantry, housed at ASEC. On that day, we provided food to 14 families/households, for a total of 44 people served -- 20 adults, 17 children, and 7 seniors. It is estimated that approximately 568 pounds of food was distributed on opening day!



Formal meetings between the three churches and interested community volunteers began the end of November 2021. ASEC was already a partner agency of the Community Food Bank of NJ (CFBNJ) which enabled them to get larger quantities of food for distribution through our local food pantry. The food obtained from the CFBNJ, as well as donations from the community and from our church, helped to stock the pantry.

A group of very active volunteers, including Rev. Aspinall, Doris Mertz of MPC, Kai Ihringer and Lynn Blakeslee from FPC, members of ASEC, numerous community volunteers, and the Long Hill Community Services Director, Shayne Daly, worked to help make the Food Pantry a reality. The group installed shelving and organized goods, created a flyer, distributed information throughout the community, picked up food from the CFBNJ in Hillside, and staffed the food pantry on opening day.

Going forward, the pantry will be open every first and third Saturday of the month. Currently, it offers non-perishable foods, dental supplies, paper goods such as toilet paper and paper towels, and cleaning supplies. It is anticipated that the pantry will add a limited number of perishable items in the future by utilizing monetary donations given for that purpose. A valid driver's license or state ID card is the only documentation needed to "shop" at the food pantry.

If you would like to become part of the Twelve Baskets Food Pantry Committee, or otherwise volunteer, please contact Lynn Blakeslee, Kai Ihringer, or Rev. Aspinall. For a list of items needed for the food pantry, please see our website or the printed flyers available in Pollard Hall. All food collected by our church will now be brought to ASEC to be distributed at the Twelve Baskets Food Pantry. To make a monetary contribution, please make your check payable to FPC, note that it is for the "Food Pantry," and our church will forward your donation to the Twelve Baskets Food Pantry account.





Pop-Top Can Tabs - Jan Somers




