Dear Church Family,

In this Epiphany season of Magi and camels, I have a favorite camel story: Once there was a Bedouin man who died and, in his will, instructed that his most valuable property, his seventeen camels, should be divided among his three sons. The eldest son was to receive one half of the camels, the second son was to get a third of his father's



camels, and the youngest was to receive one ninth. Now you can't divide seventeen camels in half, thirds, or ninths without shedding a considerable amount of camel blood and, of course, these camels had value only if they were alive. The three sons argued loud and long about what to do.

Then a wise, elderly woman who lived in a tent nearby and who could hear all the goings on, went to where her one camel was tied up. She untied her camel and added it to the father's herd of seventeen camels. Then she gave half of the now eighteen camels – that would be nine – to the eldest son. She gave six camels, or one third, to the second son. And she gave two, or one ninth, to the youngest. Then she untied the one remaining camel, her own, and took it back home.

Now I don't expect you have seen or heard a lot of camels in the past year, and I would even venture to guess you won't see a lot in the coming year. But, as you think about your own life, were there times or places when you managed to untie a knotty problem by contributing something of yours to the situation? Or did you maybe see someone else do this in a gracious, giving manner? Did you, or someone you know, find a way forward by giving, sharing, and not standing on rights? If you saw this happen, I suspect that what you saw was the power of God acting in the world.

When we can think a little differently, contribute something to a situation like an idea or a compromise or a thing that smooths the way forward, I believe that God is working through us in the world. May we all be more conscious of these moments in the coming year. May we seize these opportunities to be part of the work of God in the world.




Weekly Contributions

Mission of the Month - January - Bridges Outreach Lunch Program

During the month of January, we will be collecting donations for our Bridges Outreach Lunch Program. Currently, Toni Hopcraft and Janet Parziale prepare 40 bag lunches each month, containing a sandwich, fruit cup or applesauce, drink, snack, mustard, spoon, and napkin. The lunches are delivered to the Bridges Outreach office in Summit to be distributed to many grateful members of the homeless community in Summit, Newark, Irvington, and even New York City.

We need your help to continue our participation in this program. We have committed to providing lunches monthly in 2022. Last year we did not miss a single month, providing a total of 480 lunches at a cost of approximately \$80 per month. All <u>donations from the January Mission of the Month offering will be used towards the purchase of the items</u> that go into the lunch bags.


ShopRite Gift Cards

Do you shop at ShopRite? Well, then, you cannot afford to pass up this deal to help support the church in another small way. For the past several years, the church has been selling ShopRite gift cards (known as our *Voucher Program*). For every \$100 sold, the church earns \$5; that is, we get 5% of all sales. Over the course of a year, at times that has translated to more than a \$1,000 earned.



Return to On-Line Services




Mission Programs





The Book Club's current selection is, *"The Rose Code,"* a novel by Kate Quinn, based on the top-secret work done by codebreakers at England's Bletchley's Park during World War II. <u>The group will be **meeting via Zoom on Monday**</u>, <u>January 31st, 7:30 p.m.</u> to discuss the book. Everyone is welcome to join the group; please contact Rev. Aspinall so she can send you the Zoom link. The book is available at local libraries in several different formats.



The <u>Rose Code</u> centers on three women (Osla, Mab, and Beth) who were once closer than sisters but have been ripped apart by betrayal and misunderstanding. The women work on various aspects of codebreaking in Bletchley's Park (BP) during WWII, where the best minds in Britain train to break German military codes. The women's' friendship splinters due to Beth not warning the others (because they take an oath of secrecy) about a raid that kills Mab's husband and child. Then, Beth learns there is a traitor at BP, but she gets hauled off to an asylum so that she can't report it.

Years later, Beth calls upon the other women to help get her out before she's scheduled for

a lobotomy. Together, and by calling in a bunch of former BP cryptographers as reinforcements, they get Beth out and decode the messages (the titular "Rose Code") needed to identify and arrest the traitor.

By illuminating the top-secret work done by codebreakers, Kate Quinn has created a fresh take on World War II and created three unforgettable heroines who use their intelligence, grit, and tenacity to help save the world from Nazis. It is for lovers of historical fiction and lovers of simply good books in general.
