Dear Church Family,

David Brooks, a conservative political columnist for the New York Times and the PBS Newshour, lamented in a column a while ago that there is a lack of optimism in our political discourse. He said that politicians and columnists "wallow in the pornography of pessimism, to conclude that this country is on the verge of complete collapse. That's simply not true. We have problems, but they are less serious than those faced by just about any other nation on earth." In this case, Brooks is using the term "pornography"



in the strictest sense of depiction of something in a sensational way in order to arouse a quick and intense emotional reaction. Dramatizing, sensationalizing the bad things that happen can feed our emotions with intensity that may, but also may not, be merited. Pessimism has an immediate, "right now," "we're out of time!" quality that can waylay and even preclude the possibility of hope.

And it is this sensational pessimism that Brooks objects to. He says, "People are motivated to make wise choices more by hope and opportunity than by fear, cynicism, hatred and despair."

The church season of Lent may sometimes feel like it is about pessimism – about reminding ourselves of sin, our need for repentance, how we mess up and miss the mark. If we are not careful, it can have the same immediate, shutting-down effect as pessimism. But Lent is not about pessimism. Lent is about hope. Lent is about allowing time for the reality of Easter to sink in, letting the Good News of Christ's resurrection coming up at Easter ahead to inform and inspire hope. The meantime becomes not just about waiting but an opportunity for hope.

Emily Dickinson wrote, at a time when Protestants spent a lot of time worrying about hell, that "hope is the thing with feathers/ that perches in the soul/ and sings the tune without the words/ and never stops at all."

Lent, getting ready for Easter, inspires us to give up on a pessimistic view of our lives and the world. Lent provides time and space for patience with ourselves, an opportunity to feed our hope and not our pessimism, to allow ourselves to bear fruit, to blossom, to fulfill God's and our own plans for our lives.


Deacons' Corner


Meyersville Book Club

Earth Hour 2022 is Saturday, March 26th, 8:30-9:30 p.m.

Earth Hour is a worldwide movement organized by the World Wildlife Fund for Nature (WWF) in 2007. It is observed around the world on the last Saturday in March annually, encouraging individuals, communities, and businesses to <u>turn off</u> <u>non-essential electric lights for one hour, from 8:30 to 9:30 pm, as a symbol of</u> <u>commitment to the planet.</u>

2022 presents an incredible once-in-a-decade opportunity to push world leaders into action. Later this year, world leaders and representatives from all over the globe will be attending a crucial United Nations conference for nature and biodiversity.

The state of nature and biodiversity will be the focus of this conference, and global plans will be made for the next 10 years – decisions that will affect not only the next decade but out future and well-being for many years to come. With enough public pressure, this could be **the** conference where we secure an ambitious global commitment – similar to the Paris Agreement, but for nature – to reverse the loss of nature and biodiversity by 2030.

Why 2030? **Nature is not only our biggest provider – it's also one of our strongest allies against the climate crisis.** Unless world leaders urgently step up their efforts to protect nature, global temperatures could rise above the 1.5° Celsius limit set by the Paris Agreement as early as 2030--a decade earlier than previously expected. Any further increase in temperatures could mean irreversible damage to our planet.

With supporters in over 190 countries and happening shortly before the UN conference, Earth Hour is an unmissable opportunity to put the spotlight on this crucial conference for nature, building the global momentum needed to pressure world leaders into action.

With everyone's support, <u>Earth Hour 2022 could be the main attention that puts the environment at the center of international conversations</u>. Together we can take responsibility and show the world leaders that the <u>environment matters</u> for everyone. Therefore, immediate actions are needed to reverse the loss of the environment.




