

Dear Church Family,





newly acquired western portion of the U.S. after the Louisiana Purchase. The expedition was commissioned by President Thomas Jefferson, and the goal was to find a path across the United Sates that could be navigated by boat. For a few hundred years, the Spanish, British, French, and American settlers had all been searching for a shipping route that could be navigated by boat to transport goods from the Mississippi River to the Pacific Ocean. It would mean economic and political domination for whatever country discovered it.

The Lewis and Clark expedition traveled for months along the Missouri River. Heading upstream meant they were often carrying their supplies and canoes on their backs. They endured a cold, hard winter and a hot, mosquito-filled summer with the unwelcome company of grizzly bears and other predators.

Then one day, 15 months after leaving St. Louis, and climbing steadily uphill for days with their canoes in tow, the expedition finally arrived at the start of the Missouri in what is now Montana. Lewis wrote in his journal that as he rested there to drink from the spring that flowed into the Missouri, he felt a tremendous sense of accomplishment. He had discovered new species of plants and animals and had carefully collected specimens; despite great dangers, he had kept all but one of his crew of explorers alive; he had met and written about both friendly and hostile Native Americans; and most importantly, he believed he was within hours of meeting President Jefferson's goal. He believed that after all their hard work over more than a year, they had finally discovered the long-sought Northwest Passage. They had found the source of the Missouri River and expected that after hitting the crest of the hill just ahead of them, they would get into their canoes and paddle gently downstream and arrive at the Pacific Ocean in half a day.

In Montana, of course, this was not what they found on the other side of the hill. They, along with every other explorer for the last 300 years, found the Rocky Mountains.

At that moment, everything that Meriwether Lewis assumed about his journey changed. The plan was river travel. The plan was to have the hardest part behind them. But everything they had accomplished — which was certainly significant — was only a prelude to what was in front of them.

In some ways, both the Christian church in the U.S. and our church in particular are in the same canoe with Meriwether Lewis. The world around us is not the same, not what we expected. The road ahead looks nothing like the road behind us. Many of our assumptions about the church and its interaction with the world no longer apply. We have many past accomplishments to celebrate in the history of the church, and what we learned, what we assumed, what we expected will be of use as we move into the future, but those expectations and assumptions can no longer be our only guide.

The path ahead is uncertain; there are significant challenges, and we will continue to mourn the loss of Tom. As we move forward, we, like Lewis and Clark, will have to leave some expectations behind. But, and this is an important "but," our core identity as the people of God, the body of Christ in Stirling and Long Hill Township, will remain.

The "Discernment Team" of Lynn Blakeslee, Shaylyn Gallagan, Ed Gerecht, Kai Ihringer, Joyce Koenig, Sandy Mackay, and Kim Ridgway has begun its work with Presbytery's Church Development Team's representative, the Rev. Scott Foster. This group will be reviewing the work done by the FLHiP group and will then forge ahead in discerning a path forward for the church. As Lewis and Clark looked ahead to the enormous stone wall that was the Rocky Mountains, I expect it looked like an impossible situation. It was also, however, a great opportunity as they continued to explore and map and catalog what they discovered.

God has been with the First Presbyterian Church of Stirling from its beginning 200 years ago and will continue to journey with the congregation into the future. God will provide opportunities for ministry that have occurred to none of us yet. They may look like impossible situations at first, but my hope is that this congregation will have the vision and the courage and the trust in God's presence to seize those opportunities to be the voice and the hands and the feet of Christ in the community.

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ShopRite Gift Cards

For the past several years, the church has been selling ShopRite gift cards (known as our *Voucher Program*). For every \$100 sold, the church earns \$5; that is, we get 5% of all sales. Over the course of a year, at times that has translated to more than a \$1,000 earned.



The gift cards come in \$20, \$50, and \$100 denominations. They never expire; you can continue to use them until the balance is used up. 





Buildings and Grounds Committee

The Buildings and Grounds Committee is happy to share that the **new church boiler system and integrated hot water heater have been installed** as scheduled. We also had a new sump pump system (Zoeller 3/4 hp) with battery backup implemented in the boiler room with new PVC discharge piping. After many years of nursing along a fractious boiler and a prolonged search for a company that could obtain and install a much-needed new boiler, all our work has come to fruition. 

The Book Club's current selection is, "A Town Called Solace," a novel by Mary Lawson. The group will be meeting via Zoom on Wednesday, May 18th, 7:30 p.m. to discuss the book. This brilliant and emotionally radiant novel opens on a family in crisis. Sixteen-year-old Rose is missing. Angry and rebellious, she had a row with her mother, stormed out of the house, and simply disappeared. Left behind is seven-year-old Clara, Rose's adoring little sister. Isolated by her parents' efforts to protect her from the truth, Clara is bewildered and distraught. Her sole comfort is Moses, the cat next door, whom she is looking after for his elderly owner, Elizabeth Orchard, who went into hospital weeks ago and still has not returned. Enter Liam Kane, mid-thirties, newly divorced, newly unemployed, newly arrived in this small northern town. He moves into Mrs. Orchard's house—where, in Clara's view, he emphatically does not belong. Within a matter of hours, he gets a visit from the police. It seems he is suspected of a crime.

At the end of her life, Elizabeth Orchard is also thinking about a crime, one committed thirty years previously that had tragic consequences for two families and, in particular, for one small child. She desperately wants to make amends before she dies.

Told through three distinct, compelling points of view, the novel cuts back and forth among these unforgettable characters to uncover the layers of grief, remorse, and love that connect them. <u>A Town Called Solace</u> is a masterful, suspenseful, darkly funny, and deeply humane novel by one of our great storytellers.
